Last Week's Program

Our speaker today was Jack Sours who is the General Manager of the Oxford Casino. Jack reminded us that legal gambling in Maine goes back to 1980 when the first lottery was started. In 1983 off track betting was added and the Hollywood slots in Bangor opened in 2003.

One of the benefits of casinos in Maine is that 43 percent of the gross revenue from slots goes directly to the Maine state treasury. Sixteen percent of the table games' revenue goes to the state. That state share goes to fund K - 12 education, University of Maine and Maine Community College, and several other categories.

The casino is adding 10,000 square feet of space which will add several hundred slot machines and ten new table games. They'll be expanding the Grill and adding 40 seats to the bar. In the future they hope to build a hotel and spa and add entertainment and more restaurants. The casino

plans to expand slowly in order to remain profitable.

Other casinos coming into Massachusetts and New Hampshire are likely to have a negative effect on profits. Additional casinos in Maine will have an even greater negative effect. Casinos are not new to the USA. In the continental United States the entire population lives no more than a 3 hour drive from a casino.

The most likely next expansion to Oxford Casino will be a hotel. An interesting fact is that although one has to be at least 21 to gamble, 18 year olds can be licensed to work in the casino.
