

Last Week's Program:

Our guest speaker was Dr. Paul Taylor from Champions of Destiny, a non-profit organization he started to help the people of Burundi in East Africa. Dr. Taylor became interested in doing something to help there after his first trip there in 2010 and he has since made 2 more trips. Burundi is a 3rd world country and ranks as either the 1st or 2nd poorest nation in the world. While a lot of the people are well educated and many speak several different languages, they are relatively naïve and have a narrow view of the world. Dr. Taylor has developed a curriculum to teach them about ethics, making wise and correct decisions and character development. In searching for ways to explain things to them, he incorporated soccer skills into his program which is something they can relate to. The primary example he gave of their thinking was the city they built on top of a mountain with the source of water 3 kilometers in the valley below. He had them get estimates to put in a well so they didn't have to walk 6 kms to get water every day. When the estimate for the well came in, it was outrageously high at \$68,000. Upon further investigation Dr. Taylor discovered that they proposed pumping the water from the valley up to the city rather than drill a well in the city. It did not occur to them that there would be water up on the mountain.

Frank Shorey e-mailed me to give me the answer to the Lobster Shorey question I had last week. It seems that Frank was a DJ in Rumford back in his younger days and his radio name was Lobster Shorey. Speaking of *Frank,* he sent me info about his Florida club's latest fund raiser, an Oktoberfest being held on the 29th.
