Patty Rice introduced our guest speaker, Jen Kyllonen, Vice-president and co-founder of the Pink Feather Foundation. The Foundation started in 2011 with the goal of helping neighbors in the community, including distributing anywhere from 15 to 50 Thanksgiving food baskets. Their mission changed in 2018 when a young girl was found who needed clothing. Relying on donations, they received many bags of clothing donations to be sorted, washed and ironed. They moved from Jen's home to space in the Flagship Cinema building and then to the National Wood Products building. They provide clothing for students from kindergarten through high school. The Foundation is teacher centered, meaning that the teacher refers to the Foundation. Students are given a box of clothing with enough clothes for one week. They are constantly looking for gently used or new clothing although they have currently stopped accepting donations because they don't have any more room for more. Kids are a big part of their volunteers but they are always looking for more help. We presented Jen with a check for \$500 to help with the program.
