Curtis Cole introduced our guest speaker, Nikki Millonzi. Nikki is the chair and facilitator of the Fare Share Co-op Community Mosaic Wall. With the help of the OHMS Art Club, the Look Program Students and members of the community, 3'x5' mosaic tiles have been created and hung on the outside wall of the Fare Share building in Norway. This is the wall facing the drive-way to the public parking lot in back of the building. Three tiles were created and hung this year and Nikki is looking to have three more done next year. Each tile has a theme such as one that has garden scenes and another with pollinators – a bee, a humming bird and a bat, among others. Nikki presented a slide show showing all of the work that goes in to making one of these mosaics.
