President Chris – we shopped and distributed to the food pantries and Progress Center on Saturday, the 22nd. We delivered to the two food pantries in Otisfield (Spurs Corner and Rayville Rd.) and the one in West Paris. Our donation to the Progress Center will provide the food for their annual Christmas dinner on December 20th. The Progress Center also provides a community meal every week, serving 150 people. It is a free meal and all are welcome. There are opportunities to work with them cooking, serving and cleaning up if anyone is interested in helping.

<u>Ron</u> – Cheese Wheel sales are progressing. Today is the deadline. Ron is away for Thanksgiving so Paul will be calling Cabot with the final order later today. Chris S. went to Bethel last week and sold 11 to club members there and there may be additional purchases coming.

<u>Chris S.</u> said that the Bethel Club would appreciate our support of their harvest breakfast on November 30th. Tickets are \$7 in advance, \$8 at the door. The breakfast will be served in Ordway Hall at Gould Academy from 7:30 to 11:00.

<u>Bob</u> — went to Portland to meet with DG Lawrence Furbish about re-starting the Youth Exchange committee. He volunteered to chair the committee but needs 2 or 3 more volunteers to help him and is looking for our support. He has 8 days to put something together so he can meet all the other deadlines necessary to have inbound and out bound students ready for next year. The mid-year **Leadership Dinner** will be held on January 26th at the Fireside Inn, Westbrook and the **World Peace and Understanding Dinner** will be on February 23rd, location TBD.

Last Week was an unusual meeting because the tables were all in one long row due to the wreath making that has been going on at the church. We also did not have anyone to lead us in singing as neither Dan, Jack nor Frank were in attendance – and there were no other volunteers. Glenn was absent as well, so we had a moment of silence instead of a blessing. Table order was ladies first.

Val introduced Linda Rideout from the Norway Family Shelter at 25 Deering St. and in doing so, she also announced that she would be continuing the cooking classes at the shelter and that her new sales associate would be helping her. Linda then gave us an overview of the shelter and the programs available. The Norway shelter is for women and children only. Most of the residents come in as a result of a break-up in relationships when they find they cannot afford to rent on their own. The shelter is a large 4 bedroom home with a large kitchen and three living rooms. Residents must do their own cooking, abide by the established rules and pass a background check. The shelter does not accept anyone with a felony conviction and they cannot be in an active battering relationship which also means no protective orders for or against them. They also cannot be on the sex offender list. Residents are required to spend 10-15 hours per week on assigned cleaning chores in addition to keeping their rooms clean and picked up. Shelter staff works with residents on goals for them to resolve the issues that contributed to their homelessness and improve their situation so that they and their children can live on their own. To that end, residents must spend 30 hours per week working on their goals. There is a curfew at night, 9:00 PM on week nights and 11:00 PM weekends. Once in for the night, residents are not allowed to leave. They also must save 70% of their income – with some adjustments for things like car insurance – while they are at the shelter.
