Overcoming her initial reluctance to teaching, she taught school in North London where she said she learned a ton and still keeps in touch with some of her students. After 5 years, she and her husband returned to the states, had two children and went on with their lives. She came to teach at Poland Regional High and had lots of different positions there which helped advance her career. She came to SAD 17 as curriculum director just as the pandemic hit and at the same time, started working on her doctorate, which she hopes to finish up this summer. Things were difficult during the pandemic, but everyone stepped up and did a fantastic job. When the superintendent position opened up, she stepped in as the interim and has been working to bring everyone back together after the unfortunate experience of the prior superintendent. Her goals for the coming year are: Recovering after Covid; working on replacing 2 buildings – Agnes Gray in West Paris and the Middle School in South Paris; instituting more outdoor learning alternatives; improving attendance; positive behavior intervention; lastly, improving school safety.
