December Students of the Month (Positive Leadership)

9th grade – Carlee-Mae Cash, nominated by Lisa Whittemore

Carlee leads by example, showing students what a good and successful student looks like as she consistently shows an exemplary work ethic, producing quality work and improving whenever she can. She also leads directly, verbally encouraging students to be their best selves and do their best work. She uses an encouraging tone and inspiring words, rather than being aggressive or intimidating. She helps others see that their work and contributions are valued.

At Freshman Team 2's Bryant Pond 4H Camp field trip to promote "Becoming Your Best Self," Carlee was a standout leader among the ten students in my small group. In one activity that required students to balance their weight on a large teeter-totter style structure, Carlee spoke out saying something like "Wait a minute. Let's think about this first and make a plan." She didn't dictate her ideas; admirably she listened to what others had to say and incorporated those ideas into the plan. She led similarly in an activity to construct a shelter from a tarp. In another activity where students made something artistic, Carlee complimented and encouraged other students that their projects were good, especially when they seemed discouraged or negative. Furthermore, he freshmen tutorial teacher says Carlee leads by example. During silent reading whenever kids have a hard time settling down to read, Carlee speaks up and says "We need to stop talking and be focused. We're supposed to be reading now."

10th grade – Bradley Remillard, nominated by Matt Beattie

Bradley stands up for his peers in the way a leader does. He also makes sure to help his peers when he can when he has an extra moment in class. Bradley understands when a classmate is experiencing a hard day or is struggling with a concept or problem, and helps them if he can. He also exemplifies that struggle when he can't help his peers. In short, Bradley recognizes the qualities of a leader and should be recognized for this.

One class last week, several students were having off days and simply being in the classroom was being difficult. We were going through problems that we had just learned and the material was a struggle for all of the students. Bradley thought of his peers and encouraged them to come back to class. When they did, he offered to be in a group with them. Bradley would ask me and Mrs. Wing questions and make sure his peers were all on the same page before his group moved on. I don't know if he knew it, but he was standing up for his peers, leading them in a very effective way. The other students in the room benefitted directly from Bradley's leadership.

11th grade – Meagan Bickord, nominated by Michelle Corriveau

This girl is a self-started who takes on her role as a Teacher's Assistant very seriously. Wednesdays, she also tutors students after school. When tutoring in the library after school, she arrives early, makes her fellow student she is tutoring feel comfortable, and dives right into the work.

12th grade – Makalia Sjostrom, nominated by Fred Steeves

Makalia is my Freshman CBA Mentor and Auto Collision Teacher's Aide. I have had students fill these rolls in the past. Makalia is the best student I have ever had in both of these positions. She comes every time and asks what she can do to help. I have never had to redo or ask twice for something to be done, unlike almost every other aide I have had before. She comes to actually help, not to just get a credit or hang out.

I asked Makalia to create and type tests from a DVD series that we had. She grabbed this project and ran with it. She was eager to help me. What would have taken me a month to do in my spare time, she created, organized and filed in about 3 periods. She always gives 100%. She is also a kind and caring person. One of the CBA students was having a bad day. Makalia brought in a cake to help make the student feel appreciated. She is a great kid and deserves Student of the Month.
