February Students of the Month

Maureen Howard introduced our Students of the Month who were rescheduled from the prior week due to the snow storm and no school.

<u>**9**</u>th <u>grade – Tia Cote.</u> Tia was nominated by her English teacher. "Tia is always on task, respectful to both me and other students, always listening when others are speaking and she never puts other students down. In group work, Tia easily leads her group, yet she does not dominate. She allows others in the group to have a voice and equal ownership in the task. I like the way she stands up for what is right and I admire that she is an inspiration to others."

<u>10th grade – Angela Sanders.</u> Angela was nominated by her English teacher. "Angela is always positive and is not concerned about how she appears to others. In a classroom setting, she says what she feels, asks questions and makes observations regardless of her peers' judgment. In this way, she serves as a role model for her peers – she enjoys learning and works hard and isn't afraid of who knows it. She also listens

to and genuinely responds to her peers. She cares about others and often says compassionate and thoughtful things to them in our discussions."

<u>11th grade – Nick Buffington</u>. Nick was also nominated by his English teacher. "I had Nick as a freshman in my English class and this year, he asked to be my student aide. I have asked Nick to share his experience as a junior with my freshmen. He has talked to them about the PSAT experience and has shared other information about what they can expect as upper classmen in the areas of reading, writing and vocabulary in their future classes at OHCHS. He is a great role model and I'm pleased he chose to return to my class to help as an upperclassman at OHCHS."

<u>12th grade – Jared Jacobs</u>. Jared was nominated by our Respect Team Advisor. "Jared takes on huge technology responsibilities for public performances here at OHCHS. Event planners who wish to present any performance at OHCHS work closely with Jared to implement their programs. He has outstanding capabilities regarding sound systems and acoustics and is considered a pro at it. Multiple events have been successful because of Jared's accomplished abilities."

Last week's guest speaker

Our guest speaker was Scott Cole, Oxford County Administrator. Scott lives in Bethel and prior to taking the position as County Administrator, served as Town Manager in Bethel, Belgrade and Standish. His wife is a member of the Bethel Rotary Club.

Scott began by showing us a flow chart of responsibilities among the various departments of the county - commissioners, treasurer, deeds, sheriff, which includes jail, patrol and civil services, probate and district attorney. Virtually everything concerning these offices flows to the Commissioners through Scott's office. The county is governed by statute and essentially does what the state and towns don't do for the communities in the county. Even though some things are now state operations, such as the court system, the county provides the real estate. There are 70 full time employees, 9 elected officials, 1 district attorney and 3 commissioners. Scott told us that the commissioners, which includes our former member Steve Merrill, are very able and astute and he enjoys working with them. There are essentially three budgets – one for the county itself which totals around \$6M, the jail which is around \$1.5M and the unorganized territories which is also around \$1.5M. There are 36 towns in Oxford county and I believe he said 37 unorganized townships. The county encompasses 2100 sq. miles and occupies 1/16 of the land mass of Maine. The administrative function also encompasses the 911 system which serves 50 public service agencies. Oxford County is also one of three counties in Maine that has an airport, the other two being Hancock and Knox counties. There are many challenges in running the county, but the two major ones are to put written policies in place to better define the duties and positions of the departments and the maintenance of the buildings, figuring out what's best while maintaining the historical features.
