The Daily Extra:

200 years ago on March 8, 1817...

The New York Stock and Exchange Board is formally organized. The brokers rented rooms at 40 Wall St. with Anthony Stockholm presiding as the Board's president. The origins of the Exchange can be traced to May 17, 1792, when the Buttonwood Agreement was signed on Wall St. by twenty four brokers who agreed to trade securities on commission. The name was shortened to The New York Stock Exchange (NYSE) in 1863.
