Last week:

Susan Graves introduced our guest speaker, Lisa Dunham from the American Cancer Society. Lisa began by asking if anyone had participated in a Relay for Life and a few had. Relay for Life began in 1985 when Dr. Gordon Clapp raised \$27,000.00 by jogging for 24 straight hours. This year's Relay will begins the evening of Friday, June 13 and runs for 12 hours through the night, ending Saturday morning, June 14th. There is a survivor's dinner the night before at Hebron Academy. Any cancer survivor is welcome to attend. The American Cancer Society funds cancer research, advocacy groups that help victims, survivors and the families. They also provide many services form providing wigs to Hope Lodge, which provides free housing to patients and their families while undergoing treatment, to Care Fare, which provides train rides to Boston for patients and a care giver for \$20, avoiding the hassle of driving, tolls and parking, to Ride Service which puts patients and volunteers together to provide rides to and from treatment. Relay for Life is designed and co-ordinated around the concepts of remembering those who lost the battle, supporting those struggling with the disease and attending to their needs and endeavoring to end cancer and its effects on all those touched by it. The challenge is to get as many teams together as possible. In 2013, they raised \$1,000,000.00. Luminaries can be obtained for \$10 through various sources including our own Lynn Schott.

On April 16th, Applebee's Restaurant will donate 15% of your check to the OHCHS Interact Club towards their Relay for Life fundraiser between 4:00PM and 9:00PM. You must have a flyer with you in order for your check to be counted.
