President Knack challenged all Rotarians to donate \$25 to Polio Plus and Patty challenged us all to do so.

#### **Announcements:**

From the Board meeting on April 5, based on the survey conducted by Dan Hart, we will begin in-person meetings this week, April 14, at the church. We will also continue to Zoom for those members who are not yet comfortable in a group setting.

Due to the increased cost of food, the church ladies are increasing the cost of breakfast by \$1.00. The club will absorb this increase until the board can discuss whether or not to increase our cost of breakfast from \$10 to \$11, which of course, includes the 50/50 raffle.

The board also voted to continue with a Drive-through Lobster Fest, which if my calendar is correct, will be on Saturday, August 21, this year.

We have been asked to help out with the OHCHS Senior Picnic this year which the Board approved. This is a project the Kiwanis Club used to do. We will be getting together in the culinary arts kitchen at the high school from 11-3 on Wednesday, May 26, to prepare lunches for the students and then will need to transport the lunches and serve the students who will be at the Oxford Fair grounds the next day, May 27 (rain date May 28). The board also voted to donate three tents for the event.
