Addictions of all kinds have become a major societal issue with more and more people dying from opioid and alcohol every day, as we all know. One of the speakers told us his story and how he became involved with the program and is now one of its leaders. Teen Challenge is looking for support for continued expansion to meet increased need. <u>Happy Dollars – Lois</u> had several happy dollars. She was happy to see Janice, happy to be back in Maine, happy for Dave's successful hip replacement surgery, and her own recovery from hip replacement.
