<u>Visiting Rotarians and guests:</u> DG Carolyn Johnson visited from the Yarmouth Club and Honorary OH Rotarian, Ann Carter, also attended.

#### **Rotary Moment:**

Chris Weston shared some information about the International Convention in Sydney, Australia, which, of course, George and Patty Rice attended. One of the activities that Rotarians participated in was the Sydney Harbor Bridge climb which takes 4 hours to complete. There were 340 participants waving 278 flags from around the world. It was the largest turnout the bridge has ever seen, surpassing the climb organized by Oprah Winfrey last year. In climbing, Rotarians raised \$110,000 AUD for polio eradication.

**President Dave** shared information from the Board meeting on Monday night, June 2<sup>nd:</sup>

The Changeover Dinner is definitely scheduled for Saturday, June 28<sup>th</sup> with the location yet to be determined.

While we had hoped to do 2 road tolls this year, the date we planned to hold one for Special Olympics is not available so we will not be able to hold one for them in August. However, October 19<sup>th</sup> is available to hold one for the food pantries.

Even though we won't be having a road toll for Special Olympics this year, we will be donating \$1,500.00 to them at a future meeting. Our share of the Special Olympics dance netted us \$885 and the board voted to make up the remainder from regular club funds.

The board discussed our participating in the South Sudan project with Bridgton-Lake Region. While there was general support for the project, the board decided not to make a final decision until they had more information about the long term commitment.
