Because of all that has happened since then, I invited Andrea to come back and give us an update on what the hospital and the employees have been dealing with during these last few months. Andrea said that last February, she was working on a 90 day plan of what she wanted to accomplish right off the bat, not thinking about a global pandemic.

Andrea talked about the steps the hospital took and the things they accomplished with three days' notice that under normal circumstances might take three weeks or three months. The hospital separated well care from those who needed hospitalization. She was very impressed with the hospital staff during this time. Everyone pitched in and did more than their share. After getting ready and waiting for an influx of Covid patients, nothing happened. She said that Stephens was the only hospital in Maine that did not have one patient; there were some people that tested positive but did not need hospitalization. With questions and answers at the end of her talk, she spoke for almost 35 minutes. I think we all found her talk interesting and informative.
