Visiting Rotarians and Guests

<u>Announcements:</u>

George Rice: Sangkoo Yun from the Rotary Club of Sae Hangyang, Seoul, South Korea has been selected as RI President for the 2026-2027 Rotary year.

A Rotary member since 1987, when he was a charter member of the Rotary Club of Sae Hanyang, Yun has served Rotary International as a director, trustee, committee member and chair, and RI learning facilitator. He served for eight years as co-chair of the Keep Mongolia Green Project, by Korean members of Rotary. His RI committee roles include the Board Administration Committee (2013-15, vice chair 2014-15), the International Assembly Committee (vice chair, 2020-21), and the End Polio Now Countdown to History Campaign Committee (regional vice chair, 2023-27). He also served on The Rotary Foundation's Executive Committee (2019-22, chair 2020-21) and Programs Committee (2019-22, chair 2020-22).

Yun received The Rotary Foundation's Distinguished Service Award in 2021-22. He was appointed an Officer of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire by Queen Elizabeth II, awarded the Friendship Medal by the president of Mongolia, and recognized for distinguished services by the president and prime minister of Korea. He is a veteran of the Republic of Korea Army and an emeritus elder at Andong Presbyterian Church.

Continuing with George, with the two Lobsters for Scholars events completed, we made \$5,500.00 with a couple of bills remaining to be paid. Thanks to everyone who helped make this fund raiser a success and a special thanks to all the members who helped George put them on.

<u>Beth Abbott</u> – in talking with Jen Kyllonen, Beth told us that the Pink Feather Foundation does have to vacate their current space. If they do not find something soon, they will have to store their inventory and close until they find a space. They need a minimum of 5,000 sq. ft. The vacant Dollar store next to Bessey's would be ideal but a deal could not be made. If anyone hears of a place, please let Beth or Jen know.

Last Week:

In the absence of President Dan, who is recuperating nicely from his hip replacement surgery, PE Jeff Noblin ran both the July 31st and August 7th meetings. He led us in the Pledge of Allegiance and the 4-Way Test both weeks. Mike Carter gave the blessing on July 31st and Curtis gave the blessing last week.

Mike Carter's guest speaker on July 31st was Elizabeth Hartford, Pantry Management Specialist for the Norway Food Pantry in the Ripley Building. Elizabeth told us that the pantry is not just about food, but is a complete support system for people, providing resources and social connections. She said that they work with the Alan Day Garden among other connections – Mainers feeding Mainers. They like to use as much local produce as they can but that most of their food comes from Good Shepherd Food Bank in Auburn. They also like to provide as many healthy options as they can. Elizabeth said they work with the Western Maine Cancer Center for those who are struggling with food and medicine insecurity. They also have a Food is Medicine program, dealing with people who have diabetes and pre-diabetes, and they provide information on mental health, career information and indoor and outdoor physical activity. Lastly, the Pantry has seen a 62% increase over last year in the number of people they serve.

<u>Our meeting on August 7th was a Club Assembly.</u> PP George began by explaining the cheese wheel situation since Cabot has told us they are no longer going to make the cheese wheels we have been successfully selling the last few years. We can get 2 lb. bricks, but, apparently, they will be no different than what is commercially available in the super market. They can be boxed and we can get smaller deliveries so we don't have to go to Farmington and get the whole lot all at once. However, we don't have cost information at this time.

In other news, <u>**PP** Beth</u> told us that we will not be doing parking and admissions at the Fair this year because we don't have enough people to fill in all the slots. That was an easy fund raiser for us and is an unfortunate loss.

Lastly, we discussed setting a tent for WMARI in September for their annual Recovery Rally in Moore Park. They asked if we would consider giving them a discount, but it was decided to charge them full price as we have done in the past.
