Announcements:

<u>President Dan</u> feels it is important that we celebrate one another and last week, he asked us to celebrate PP and PDG George Rice for his years of service and dedication to our club and to Rotary.

Dan also presented <u>Frank Shorey</u> with his 40th year perfect attendance award. Although Frank is only with us in person a few meetings a year since he and Connie retired to Florida, Frank has kept his attendance going with make-ups, Zoom and other community activities. Congratulations, Frank.

<u>Dave P.</u> waited for Liz to crunch all the numbers before announcing our take from the Cornhole Tournament last month. We made \$1,382.41, an okay amount. We received a lot of positive feedback, but we need more players.

Last Week:

President Dan returned just three weeks after his hip replacement surgery. He led us in the pledge and 4-Way Test. Curtis Cole gave the invocation.

Before our guest speaker, Dan talked a bit about membership and how the Bethel club has been attracting new members. One suggestion is not to ask prospective members directly to come to a meeting, but to interact with them and let them know about Rotary, let them see what Rotary means to us and if they like what they see, encourage them to come as our guest.

Continuing, Dan also said that he would like his year to be about kindness, hence the bumper stickers he had made. There are still plenty available, so spread the word.

Curtis Cole introduced his guest speaker, Troy Ripley, Chair of the SAD 17 school board. Troy said he is definitely a native, having been the first baby born at Stephen's Memorial in 1963.

As chair of the school board, he said that it is an exciting time as there is a lot going on in the district, but there are an enormous number of challenges working with 8 towns with varying needs and wants. He appreciates the work of Superintendent Heather Manchester as they meet frequently to discuss various ideas and policies that the board and she would like to implement, whether they agree on those ideas or not! The two major issues facing the district right now is the defeat of the school budget twice, in June and again in August. There will be a 3rd vote on October 1 which hopefully will pass this time. The second issue is the replacement of 2 school buildings, the Agnes Gray school in West Paris and the middle school in South Paris/Oxford. Troy said yes, we can get funding from the state, but it is an almost 5-year process. The state also puts stipulations on the money in that they want schools with a minimum of 400 students and a middle school with grades 6,7 and 8, not just a 2-year middle school for 7th and 8th grades. And of course, Agnes Gray's enrollment is far less than 400. In talking about the budget and building new schools, they are two separate issues and we need to do a better job of helping the public understand this.
