Lois Strauss from Estero, Florida, was our visiting Rotarian. Her guest was Robert Wilgosz. Frank and Joel joined us on Zoom.

Announcements:

Program Chair Chris Summers introduced Paris Town Assessor, Cindy Namer. After giving us a bit of her background, including a 30 year career with the Maine State Housing Authority, she talked about what is involved in assessing property. The Maine Constitution requires property taxes to be "assessed equally according to the just value thereof...." In other words, it is the responsibility of the Assessor to adjust property values to meet this constitutional requirement. Maine law requires the ratio between overall municipal assessed value and sale prices to be within 70% - 110% of "just value", and if the assessor is unable to meet those standards, the State requires municipal assessors to adjust properties accordingly to maintain acceptable ratio standards.

Cindy handed out a complete explanation of how all of this works.
