We had 12 teams for the Cornhole Tournament on Saturday afternoon, and while we didn't make a lot of money, the event went well and everyone seemed to have a good time.

Update on PP Pat Cook – Val Weston connected with Debbie McDonnell, Bruce Cook's daughter. She told Val that Pat is now living in Tucson, Arizona, close to her oldest daughter, Meg. Her address is:

After the announcements, Program Chair John Griffith introduced our guest speaker, Alison Jones Webb, MA, MPH, author of <u>Recovery Allies: How to Support Addiction Recovery and Build Recovery-Friendly</u> <u>Communities.</u>

Alison started off by telling us that she has a long-time connection to Rotary, having been a Rotary Exchange student in Sweden when she was 16 years old. She grew up in Ohio but lived in Waterville for 25 years and Portland for 10 years before retiring and moving to Virginia. Her career has always been in public health, working in the recovery community, trying to learn the lay of the land and the stigma associated with substance abuse. She later focused on what people and communities can do to help people recover. Housing is a major problem for folks trying to recover from addiction. There are 120 residences in Maine available, but often that is not enough. Helping people in recovery means keeping them focused and busy – volunteer work, education, employment and connecting with people around them are all part of the process. These are all areas where members of the community can help.
