<u>President Chris</u> –Don't forget that our meeting on Wednesday, August 30, will be an evening meeting at Norway Country Club. The cost of the meeting which includes a full dinner is \$22. A sign-up sheet was circulated and will be again this week.

Chris also lead a discussion on keeping track of the time we spend as Rotarians other than attending regular meetings – such has tents, the Auction, the Lobster & Steak Fest, board meetings and anything

else we do for Rotary. The final decision was for us to keep our own individual totals and let Stan know every week when we come in. He will keep track and pass the info on to President Chris.

Chris read a note from DG Dave Underhill concerning World Polio Day:

"Give to Polio Plus between July 1st and September 30th and you'll be entered into a drawing – you could be Sleepless in Seattle to commemorate World Polio Day!"

"Perhaps you have watched Rotary's World Polio Day Live Streaming Event on your computer durng the last couple of years. It has been a terrific way to learn more about the status of our signature campaign to End Polio Now. Two years ago, it originated from New York City and last year from the US Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta. This year, World Polio Day will be beld in Seattle in recognition of the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation's support of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative."

"A generous District 7780 Rotarian has donated airfare and a hotel room for one of us to travel to Seattle for World Polio Day on October 24th. This is a chance to be in the audience and see "up close and personal" what major players in the field have to say. We don't promise that you will be able to meet Bill Gates, but just maybe!"

All you have to do to enter:

"Make a donation to Polio Plus of at least \$25.00 between July 1st and September 30, 2017. Each individual donor, regardless of the amount given, will be eligible for the drawing and the lucky winner will be heading west in October. Actually, the real lucky winners will be the children in Nigeria, Afghanistan and Pakistan, where we are on the brink of eliminating this disease forever!"

"If you make your donation on-line, which is very easy to do, it can be made any time right up to September 30. If you choose to do it by check, mail it by September 22 to be sure it will get to Evanston in time to be processed."

"This is a unique and very fun way to encourage donations to help End Polio Now and we hope many of you will jump in and participate. And please note, it is "at least \$25" but there is no prohibitions on larger donations. Every donation is eligible for the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation's 2:1 match so your contribution is tripled."

"Let's keep up the effort and soon we will be celebrating Rotary's tremendous achievement – the eradication of this dread disease."

There were many other things discussed so we should be in good shape for Saturday.

<u>Peter and Becky Kaurup</u> purchased 2 of their Lobster & Steak Fest ticket for themselves and then donated the remaining 8 tickets back to the club to go to younger veterans who would not be part of the Veteran's Home contingent. I believe it was said that we are working through the American Legion to reach these veterans.

<u>UPDATE:</u> The annual Lobster & Steak Fest was a great success once again. Traffic was pretty steady from the time we opened at 3:00PM until we closed at 6:00PM. We had some concerns when the lobster and clam delivery was late, but we still had time to get the clams washed and bagged. There

were a few glitches with the serving line and timing but nothing serious. <u>Just Us Two</u> provided the entertainment for the fourth year and were very well received once again. We used the big white tent for seating and it worked well, although some thought it was warmer under it than under the smaller tents. It didn't rain and the morning clouds pretty much cleared by serving time. I don't have any figures but I believe I heard that we hit 400 dinners. It was a lot of work and many thanks to all who came out and helped.

120 years ago - 1897:

New house - \$2,700 Average Annual income - \$400 Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show playing in Brooklyn, NY - \$0.25 for children, \$0.50 for adults New typewriter - \$25 Golf Cap - \$1 Men's dress shirt - \$1.50 Singer Sewing Machine - \$9 Boat Fare – NYC to Southampton, England - \$60

In November, William McKinley defeated William Jennings Bryan to become the 25th President of the United States. McKinley carried 23 of 45 states with a total of 7,000,000 votes.

The inaugural Boston Athletic Association road race took place on April 19, 1897 and featured 15 skilled distance runners. The 24.5 mile foot race was held as a conclusion to the B.A.A. games and the winning runner was John J. McDermott of New York with a time of 2:55:10.

After a few years of favorable publicity and patent applications, Ransom E. Olds, with an infusion of capital from many around the Lansing, Michigan area, incorporated the Olds Motor Works in August of 1897.
