This Week: MAINE SPORTS LEGEND CINDY

A native of Clinton, Maine, Blodgett led Lawrence High School to four straight Class A State Championships (1991-1994). She is Maine's all-time leading scorer in high school basketball with 2,596 career points. She was named Maine Gatorade Player of the Year in 1992, 1993 and 1994, and was Miss Basketball in Maine in 1994. Blodgett was also the Portland Press Herald Athlete of the Year in 1994, and the recipient of the Bangor Daily News Owen Osborne Award.

Recruited by then-UMO Coach Joanne McCallie Palombo (now coach at Duke), Cindy played four years at Maine and received two America East Player-of-the-Year awards; four WBCA District I All-America honors; three time ECAC Division I All-Star; four NCAA Tournament appearances; four America East Tournament MVP awards; four time America East First-Team selection. A four-time All-American, Blodgett was just the second woman in NCAA Division I history to lead the nation in scoring for two consecutive seasons, averaging over 27 points per game in her sophomore and junior seasons at Maine. She finished her career with the Black Bears with 3,005 points, breaking a total of 20 school records. Blodgett ranks sixth all-time in NCAA history in scoring. She led Maine to its first four appearances in the NCAA Tournament in the program's history. In both 1996 and 1998, she was the America East Player of the Year.

No slouch in the classroom either, Cindy earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Elementary Education from Maine in 1998, graduating cum laude. She earned Academic All-America honors in 1998.

After her storied career at the University of Maine, Blodgett went on to play in the WNBA from 1998-2002. Drafted sixth overall in 1998, she played for the Cleveland Rockers for one season, before going on to play with the Sacramento Monarchs for three seasons. She has also played internationally in Korea, two years in France and for the National Women's Basketball League.

She was named Coach of the Black Bears in May of 2007.

Mark introduced, John Spritz, a member of the Portland Charter Commision representing District 4, the Broad Cove area of Portland by suggesting that some might find it boring. Given the questions that followed John's presentation, nobody fell asleep!

John began by reminding us that the purview of the Commission was more than recommending for or against having a full time, somewhat powerful, elected mayor in Portland. As a matter of fact, they started off with about 25 to 30 ideas of how to create the perfect People Democratic Republic and whittled it down to 3: a) an elected mayor with some powers, b) a structured process for the School Committee, and 3) clean up the guiding jure mayor versus a titular mayor is nothing new but came to a head because of the upheavals involving the failed Maine State Pier and the painful closing of the Clifford School. The 12 member panel, 9 elected and 3 appointed, covered the extremes in position and definitely included people who came in with the decision made in their mind before the facts had been gathered (gee is that something new in politics?). At the end of it all some allowed their minds to be open and a couple remained convinced that they knew it all to begin with and needed not to be polluted with facts or alternatives; yet they voted unanimously to let the matter go to the voters.

Mr Spritz clarified some of the elements of the elected mayor position. The mayor would not usurp the powers of the City Manager nor would they be just a tie breaker. They would have veto power over that small slice of the budget that is not pre ordained and that could be the fulcrum they use to move things along. Furthermore, they would be the face and force of Portland up in Augusta. The salary of the full time mayor would be \$67,000 which is less than the Superintendent of Schools, and many other city professionals, make but 50% more than the average household income of a Portland family. The election of the mayor will be in the off year so as not to get caught up and set aside by major elections.

One thing is for sure, nobody fell asleep listening to John Spritz and he is a excellent spokesperson for the proposition. Now, make sure you get out and vote!
