Homework for the February 12 discussion

Homework for the February 12 discussion:

Luke 6:38 – (King James Bible translation):

Give, and it shall be given unto you; good measure, pressed down, and shaken together, and running over, shall men give into your bosom. For with the same measure that ye mete withal it shall be measured to you again.

Measure for Measure is generally considered one of Shakespeare's "problem plays." The First Folio places this play with the "comedies" because it ends in three or four marriages (depending on the production decisions). Vincentio, the duke of Vienna, observes that the laws forbidding fornication are being ignored. He proposes to put Angelo, the paragon of morality, in charge of the city and take a vacation. This is, in fact, the first of his many lies and the Duke disguises himself as a friar to watch what happens. Angelo attempts to enforce the existing laws on fornication. Among the characters are a pimp and madam worried about lost business. Claudio's problems start with a pregnant fiancé, and the main plot involves Angelo using state power to rape (figuratively or actually – depending on the production) Claudio's religious novice sister, Isabella. Claudio wants to marry Juliet, but is sentenced to death, as the first example of strict enforcement. Isabella, a novice nun about to enter the strict order of "Clairs," visits him in jail and reluctantly agrees to plead with Angelo for leniency. Angelo meets with Isabella. He is overcome by her chastity and offers to spare Claudio's life if she agrees to sleep with him. She returns to her brother's cell expecting he will understand her refusal to sacrifice her virginity in return for his life. Claudio begs her to reconsider and she coolly suggests he get his affairs in order.

The Duke has been watching from the sidelines disguised as a friar. He tells Isabella that he has a scheme that will set all to right: Angelo had previously been engaged to marry Marianna, but reneged on his promise when her dowry was lost at sea. The Duke proposes that Marianna disguise herself as Isabella and sleep with Angelo instead. This is "*the bed trick*."

However, after the sex, Angelo fears his hypocrisy might be discovered and he orders that Claudio be executed immediately. The (disguised) Duke/friar then proposes a new scheme (*the "head trick*)". Instead of Claudio's head, they will send Angelo the head of a guilty prisoner. Unfortunately, the only criminal up for execution is too drunk to be morally killed. In the nick of time, a random pirate dies of fever, and, as severed heads are pretty much fungible, that head is removed and sent to Angelo. The Duke/friar "tests" Isabella by telling her Claudio has been executed.

The Duke returns to power and Isabella and Marianna petition him for "Justice," with Isabella publically stating that she had sex with Angelo, as she believes, to unsuccessfully save her brother's life. The Duke feigns ignorance and orders her removed. Angelo blames everything on the mysterious friar who's been hanging about, and he's backed up by a local gentleman pimp, Lucio. The Duke sneaks out the back way and returns disguised as the friar, whereupon Lucio accuses the friar of various crimes. The Duke reveals himself (again). He sends Angelo off stage to marry Marianna. He then condemns Angelo to death, as measure for measure demands for the "death" of Claudio. He proposes marriage to Isabella but gets no answer. Marianna pleads to save Angelo's life. She asks Isabella to join in the plea (who still believes that Angelo is responsible for her brother's death). The Duke then trots out the living Claudio and reunites him with Juliet. He condemns Lucio to marry the whore who bore his child years ago (and may either call for his subsequent torture/hanging or pardons his life – depending on the director's whim). Finally, the Duke makes Isabella a second (better) offer of marriage. The play's text does not reveal her reply.
