The Origin of Rotary: Paul Harris,

Founder Rotary started with the vision of one man - Paul Harris. The Chicago attorney formed the Rotary Club of Chicago on 23 February 1905, so professionals with diverse backgrounds could exchange ideas and form meaningful, lifelong friendships. Paul wanted to create a professional group representing the friendly smiles and smalltown values he had known in his youth. Rotary's global expansion began early. The chartering of the Rotary Club of Montevideo, Uruguay, in February 1919, brought Rotary to South America. As the club expanded across countries and continents, the name Rotary International was finally adopted in 1922. Now, 115 years later, World Peace and Understanding Day on February 23rd marks the founding of one of the largest philanthropic organizations in the world.

Early Rotarians were instrumental in championing the United Nations as a viable alternative to war, so much so that 49 Rotarians helped draft the United Nations Charter. "It is true that the way to war is a well-paved highway and that the way to peace is still a wilderness," said Harris in 1949. Rotary International has been a non-religious, non-political, non-partisan organization from the very beginning. In 1979, Rotary began a project to immunize six million children against polio in the Philippines. The effort's success led to Rotary making polio eradication its top priority. Women were finally allowed to join Rotary International in 1987 after a ruling by the U.S. Supreme Court, and today about 18% of members worldwide are women. Keep the 4way test in mind whether it's Valentine's Day, or World Peace and Understanding Day. Building good will and better friendships is always the right thing to do!
