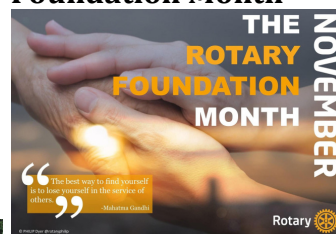

The Rotary Foundation



November is The Rotary Foundation (TRF) month and donations to the annual Programs Fund are matched by the District. The money is held for 3 years by The Rotary Foundation and then half is returned to the District for grants. Our club has received several grants for the book project and for the work in Guatemala. The smallest grant is now \$15,000. Donations to Polio Plus go directly to fund immunizations. Grants must be tied to one of the following 7 areas of focus of The Rotary Foundation .

Fighting Disease: Educate and equip communities to stop the spread of life-threatening diseases like polio, HIV/AIDS, and malaria. Improve and expand access to low-cost and free health care in developing areas.

Providing clean water, sanitation and hygiene: Support local solutions to bring clean water, sanitation and hygiene to more people every day. Rotary doesn't just build wells and walk away. They share their expertise with community leaders and educators to make sure the projects succeed long term.

Supporting education: More than 775 million people over the age of 15 are illiterate. The goal is to strengthen the capacity of communities to support basic education and literacy, reduce gender disparity in education and increase adult literacy.

Saving mothers and children: Nearly 6 million children under the age of five die each year because of malnutrition, poor health care and inadequate sanitation. Expand access to quality care so mothers and their children can live and grow stronger.

Promoting peace: Foster understanding within and across cultures. Train adults and young leaders to prevent and mediate conflict and help refugees who have fled dangerous areas.

Growing local economies: Projects that enhance economic and community development and create opportunities for decent and productive work for young and old. Strengthen local entrepreneurs and community and community leaders, particularly women in improvised communities.

Protecting the environment: Tackling environmental issues with projects using Rotary connections to change policy and planning for the future.
