Brenda Weiss in Kosovo

Brenda Weiss showed slides and talked about her experience so far with the Peace Corps in Kosovo at the Rotary meeting on November 11. When she arrived, she was first sent for training in a town of 10,000 close to Macedonia where the residents are mostly Albanian Muslims. The town, in which they now live, has several streets lined with shops and mosques. There are many small produce markets and stores that sell construction materials. The town has a walkway and bike trail a long the river, a small hospital and clinic, post office and police and fire departments.

The Weisses live in a 2 bedroom apartment with a kitchenette and a dishwasher. They wake to the sounds of a rooster crowing and a call to prayer. The water supply doesn't keep up at peak times. The schools have a limited preschool and kindergarten and a high drop out rate. There is high unemployment and a faltering economy. The schools have a shortage of materials and computers and low teacher pay. Many teachers have a 2nd job.

Brenda is teaching in a vocational high school of 460 students. There are classes in metal work. auto repair, IT, administration, hydraulics and electronics. The school day has a morning session 8:30 am to 12:40 pm and afternoon from 2 pm to 7 pm. Classes are 40 minutes and students stay in the classroom. The teachers move to the students. Elementary is 1-9 grade and high school of 10 to 12th grade is not required. Brenda's classes are mostly male. The students don't speak English well. Small towns are where you find your people, she said, so she and Tom have joined a biking club. They bike or hike every Saturday. They have 2 favoite hikes, one of which she showed in a slide of a meadow nearby. They sang old Albanian folk songs and celebrated the 25th anniversary of Kosovo becoming a country and the Weisses received an award for environmental work. On a trip up a mountain, the Weisses were in a rollover crash of their truck. They were taken to the hospital to be checked out, but were OK. A river flows through their town and there is a buildup of plastic bottles. These are some of the trash issues that Thom Weiss plans to work on. Many thanks to Brenda and Thom for their

wonderful work in the world in the spirit of Rotary and for Brenda's report.
