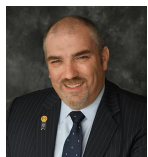

ROTARY'S SHELTER BOXES

Brian Glenn, an ambassador for Rotary's Shelter Box program as well as a Response Team member, addressed Breakfast Rotary on October 12. Shelter Boxes go anywhere in the world where people are displaced from their homes, Brian said. Twenty years ago, shelter boxes were started in Cornwall, England in response to more than 300 disasters in the world. A shelter box includes a tent, designed for disasters, weighing 75 pounds for living in for 6 months. Also included is a block of defused light good for 8 to 12 hours in the darkness. mosquito net, water filters, ground cloths, blankets, tools, cooking utensils, and school supplies. The box weighs 120 pounds and costs about \$1,000. Sometimes they only deliver tents plus the shelter tool kit, or just deliver tools to build small houses. Sometimes they just put a tarp over walls. The boxes are delivered by a large plane, or by sea, rail, car, or horse. Rotary delivers in person so they go to the right destination. Shelter boxes have gone to Ethiopia, Nigerian, Syria, Somalia, the Philippines, and Indonesia. They have responded to 11 disasters this year. In Syria, they added bars of soap to stop the spread of germs. They get people out of large groups and into tents and teach hygiene. Rotary has up to 10,000 shelter boxes ready to go. They are kept at UN depots. Brian Glenn grew up in Denton, TX and after graduating from the University of North Texas in 1958, went to work for the Denton Fire Department. He recently retired as a Battalion Chief overseeing the Emergency Medical

Services for the City. As a member of the Denton/Lake Cities Rotary club, he signed up as an ambassador for shelter boxes and began training as a Response Team member, which takes a year. He has assisted with disasters in the Philippines, Fiji, Argentina, Paraguay, Haiti, Indonesia and Oklahoma.
