In June, 2020 the The Rotary Foundation Trustees and the Rotary International Board of Directors voted unanimously to approve the Environment as the seventh Area of Focus. In January, 2021, they finalized the policy detailing the kinds of projects that will now become eligible for Global Grants. The Rotary Foundation began accepting grant proposals in July, 2021. Start planning now for your 2023-2024 project.



Eligible projects cover an array of fields:

- Protecting and restoring land, coastal, marine, and freshwater resources
- Enhancing the capacity of communities and local governments to support natural resource management and conservation
- Supporting agroecology and sustainable agriculture, fishing, and aquaculture practices to improve ecological health
- Addressing the causes of climate change and climate disruption and supporting solutions to reduce the emission of greenhouse gases
- Strengthening the resilience of ecosystems and communities affected by climate change and climate disruption
- Supporting education to promote behaviors that protect the environment
- Advocating for the sustainable consumption of products and the environmentally sound management of byproducts to build a more resource-efficient economy
- Addressing environmental justice issues and environmental public health concerns

"If it is to be, it is up to me"*





"If it is to be, it is up to me." That statement was used by one of the speakers at the March Chesapeake Presidents' Elect Training Seminar, who was a storyteller. Wow, what a statement. It consisted of ten two-letter, one-syllable words but the impact of those words, and their implied action and responsibility were powerful. They fit right in with Rotary's People of Action concept. Ultimately it is up to each of us to determine our goals and then provide the leadership, inspiration, courage, and accountability to accomplish them. The Rotary Foundation depends on every Rotarian for its funding, whether it be individual donations, conducting fund-raising events, or getting corporate support. It also depends on Rotarians to

use TRF to do Rotary's good works around the world. It is something to think about as we start out April and the Spring.

Why is the above statement important? We now have less than 3 months remaining in this Rotary year. Have you donated to The Rotary Foundation this Rotary year? How is your club doing? We are still significantly behind last year's Annual Fund-SHARE giving total. Here are some quick facts. District 7610 has 1864 Rotarians in it. Three hundred of those Rotarians belong to the Paul Harris Society and pledge to give \$1000 per year to TRF as long as they are able. That leaves 1564 other Rotarians. If every Rotarian in the District became at least a Sustaining Member, that's \$100 per RY or \$.28 per day we would be up to \$456,400. We would still be behind where we were last year at this time, but we would be a lot closer. We currently have donated \$362,318 to the Annual Fund-SHARE. That is 54.5% less than where we were at the end of March 2022. The good news is that we are now at \$63,242 for PolioPlus giving, which is 13.8% above March of 2022.



Remember, in three years 47.5% of what our district donates to the Annual Fund-SHARE is returned to the district as District Designated Funds. Up to 50% of those funds can be used for the District Grant which currently is \$86,050. Split between 52 clubs and the maximum each club may receive will only be \$1654. It is not too late to give. I know we can do this. Become a Sustaining Member for this RY with a donation of \$100 to the Annual Fund-SHARE and let's change the above quote to read: **"If it is to be, it is up to US"!**


women's access to elective office, harmonizing energy and peace, and integration experiences of unaccompanied migrant children to name but a few.




How did your club use its District Grant this year?



Bigger than polio

Pakistan's female vaccinators are doing more than helping end a disease

Women make up two-thirds of Pakistan's polio workforce. It is a role born of necessity, as cultural norms prevent men from entering many people's homes in Pakistan. Women can build mom-to-mom relationships and provide trusted advice, not only about polio but about other health issues. For example, diphtheria, tetanus, and acellular pertussis vaccine (also known as DTaP) combined with inactivated poliovirus vaccine (also known as IPV) is a combination vaccine that is given to protect against infections caused by diphtheria, tetanus (lockjaw), pertussis (whooping cough), and poliovirus.

"Women working with women on the front line is going to be what gets us across the finish line," says Rotary President Jennifer Jones, who met last year with polio workers in Pakistan. The country and Afghanistan are the only two where wild poliovirus is still transmitted persistently. The female vaccinators' work is neither safe nor easy. The women in Pakistan are sworn at, shoved, beaten, and some even killed. They're fighting misinformation. But their work is crucial — and not just for the cause of polio eradication.

"They are supporting their education, they're supporting their household, they're giving a change in Pakistan," says Sadia Shakeel, coordinator for a Rotary-supported polio resource center in Karachi who calls them "little entrepreneurs." Most of the women range in age from 21-38 and have their own children, she says. Yet they wake to say prayers before dawn, feed their children breakfast, and leave to start their work to end a disease.

Employing women is one key strategy of the [Global Polio Eradication Initiative](#). And that's not just to deliver the vaccines at the front line; it's also to hire women as supervisors, doctors, and decision-makers. "We cannot succeed without the women we have in the program at all levels," says Hamid Jafari, a pediatric infectious disease doctor and director of polio eradication for the [World Health Organization's](#) Eastern Mediterranean region.

We have come a long way in the fight against polio. Before the [Global Polio Eradication Initiative](#) started in 1988, the disease paralyzed more than a thousand children a day. We are close to the finish line, but the case in New York, where polio was eradicated more than 30 years ago, is a sobering reminder that polio is just a plane ride away and until every child is immunized, polio will continue to be a threat to every child.


