- 10 years since the World Health Organization (WHO) South-East Asia Region was certified free of polio

- 50 years since the launch of the Expanded Program on Immunization, which ensures equitable access to vaccines (including polio vaccines)



Your Report from the PolioPlus Corner

2023/2024 Polio Case Totals. The chart below shows “final” 2023 case totals for wild polio and vaccine-derived polio. It also shows early data for 2024, indicating that 3 wild polio cases have already emerged from the Pakistan/Afghanistan area.

High Tech Polio Tracking. When polio vaccinators fanned out across the Democratic Republic of the Congo last year to stop an outbreak of vaccine-derived polio, they carried a powerful new tool: cellphones that tracked their progress as they went from door to door. Equipped with an app, the phones send data back to a command center where staff can see missed homes on a digital map and redirect teams on the ground. The country is helping pioneer geospatial tracking to stop polio outbreaks.

Female Mobiliser Vaccinators. If lack of access to vaccinate is the primary constraint on eliminating the last few wild polio cases, this may be one way to overcome the problem. Women in the Female Mobiliser Vaccinator (FMV) program in Afghanistan are leading vital immunization efforts to reach every child and end polio in the country. Since its inception in 2020, this groundbreaking project has expanded to 20 out of the country’s 34 provinces. Today, there are over 650 FMVs reaching thousands of women and children every day in hundreds of locations countrywide. Reaching more women means reaching more children, reducing missed vaccinations and broadening the cohort of fully immunized children.



70 Years in an Iron Lung! Last month, the person holding the record for living in an iron lung passed away. A Paul Alexander, who contracted polio at the age of 6, died after spending the better part of 70 years in an iron lung. Resilient to the end, Paul could leave the apparatus for parts of each day, but preferred the safety and familiarity of the iron lung for most of the time rather than the compact respirators now available. Despite this encumbrance, Paul used work-arounds to secure legal training, became a practicing attorney, spoke frequently at Rotary events, and was even an e-club Rotarian for a period of time. With his passing, we lost both an inspiration and a reminder of times gone by.

Polio Breakout Session at RI Convention. For those of you going to the RI Convention in Singapore next month, you may wish to attend the "Together, We End Polio" breakout session on May 28 from 3:30-4:30. You'll hear the latest updates on our polio eradication efforts, how Rotary members in polio-affected countries are making an impact, and what you can do to support Rotary’s goal of a polio-free world.
