An afternoon of delights: District 7610 celebrates club & member accomplishments for The Rotary Foundation

As the song goes, *the afternoon delights* we experienced during our luncheon was celebrating the RY 2022/2023 results of our club and members donation efforts for The Rotary Foundation!

Of the 539 Rotary districts worldwide, our D 7610 ranked 30th in giving over \$200 per capita (\$269.22) and 50th in total contributions. Our official final total for RY 2022-2023 was \$926,698.

Special Rotarian Meritorious Foundation Service Awards were made to:

 Water Alliance.

Friendly Competitions Help Raise Funds for OUR TRF



We all realize The Rotary Foundation and the serious work we do with its funding is not trivial. TRF is not a competitive sport. But it can be a bit of fun while motivating and inspiring our members to push their giving a bit by interjecting a friendly competition into the giving process.

That was always the purpose behind the Paul Harris Cup and the Ylonen Trophy. In case you are not familiar with them an explanation is in order.

The **Paul Harris Cup** is a traveling award between Rotary districts 7600 and 7610 to be presented annually in recognition of the district with the higher per capita giving. The sole purpose of the cup competition is to encourage additional giving to The Rotary Foundation Annual Fund which in turn provides Rotary clubs in both districts with more resources to support the programs of The Rotary Foundation. Since the inception of the award

in 2010-11, District 7610 has retained the cup. This past Rotary year District 7600 has won the cup with per capita giving of \$284.97 beating our district \$269.22 per capita giving.

You can monitor your own club per capita giving by reading over the District 7610 Foundation Giving Report found at the end of this newsletter (the middle column lists each club per capita giving).

The **Ylonen Trophy** is named after the late District Governor Charles S. "Chuck" Ylonen. This trophy is presented to the club with the highest last 3-year average per capita giving by its members to the Annual Fund of The Rotary Foundation.

For RY 2022-2023, the recipient of the Ylonen Cup was the Rotary Club of Manassas (3 year $\underline{avg} = \$1,737.85$)

ıst Runner-up was the e-Club of Global Peacebuilders (3 year avg = \$973.73)

2nd runner-up was the Rotary Club of Crystal City-Pentagon (3 year. <u>avg</u> = \$947.94)

For the first time since the friendly competition has been held, District 7600 was declared the winner of the Paul Harris Cup at the district recognitions and awards luncheon.

Hunger walk draws attention to climate change, food insecurity

Early on a Saturday morning, as the sun cast a warm glow over the gathering crowd, we marveled at the diversity of those assembled for the first event of our FutureFeed campaign. The event was an awareness walkathon organized to advocate for climate justice and food security in collaboration with the World Wildlife Fund of Nepal and Save the Children Nepal. We wanted to host a fun event that would both convey the urgency of climate change and food insecurity and engage a wide audience.

When many people think about climate change, they often think only of temperature shifts, overlooking other impacts such as rising food insecurity. Climate change disrupts agricultural patterns, leading to crop failures and food shortages.

That exacerbates poverty and inequality and leaves vulnerable communities even more defenseless against hunger.

Food insecurity is not just about lack of food, but also about not getting the necessary calories. In urban areas, due to disrupted agricultural patterns, people rely heavily on junk food and contaminated produce containing pesticides and insecticides, failing to meet their calorie needs. In major cities of Nepal, families – particularly those with children in their developmental stages – often avoid market-available produce due to fear of toxins.

Recognizing these issues, we organized an engaging and interactive walk to educate the community and urge action. The rhythmic beating of traditional musical instruments echoed in the air, harmonizing with loud slogans chanted by the walkers. People carried artistic banners demanding climate justice and food security. The slogans were soon echoed by passerby, creating a powerful chorus.

A total of 510 people from diverse backgrounds – young and old, celebrities, ordinary citizens, and individuals of various ethnicities – came together for our Hunger Walk. Watching the event unfold, we were deeply moved by the genuine empathy and unity displayed by the participants. It wasn't just a walk; it was a collective journey towards a brighter, more sustainable future.

What struck me most was how the event bridged the gap between celebrities, environmental activists, the National Human Rights Commission Team, Rotarians, influencers, representatives from international organizations like WWF Nepal and Save the Children Nepal, and members of the Wheelchair National Cricket Team. Everyone walked side by side, sharing stories and experiences. The inclusivity and diversity of our walk didn't just make for a successful event, it ignited a movement.

Change begins with a single step, but it gains momentum when those steps are taken in unison. The Hunger Walk was more than just a walk; it was a leap towards a future where the effects of climate change are minimized, no one goes to bed hungry or relies on tainted food, and every individual – regardless of background – contributes to creating a more sustainable society.

The walk was just the beginning of our FutureFeed campaign, a dedicated effort to advocate for climate justice and food security. We will continue our journey toward a more sustainable and equitable future!

This month, we'll address some of the most frequently asked questions our readers have. Some may appear obvious, but the fact that they're still being asked means they need to be addressed.

FAQ #1—Did Rotary make its goal of receiving \$50 Million in donations to the PolioPlus Fund this past Rotary year? Answer: Yes. None of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation 2-for-1 \$100 Million match money was "left unused on the table". It was all provided to TRF by the Gates Foundation, and the entire

\$150 Million was granted by Rotary to WHO and UNICEF for the fight against polio. Thank you!

FAQ #2—What's the main problem in reducing the last few wild polio cases that we're seeing in Afghanistan and Pakistan? Answer: Lack of access to vaccinate children. This is caused by severe floods and earthquakes, lethal danger to polio workers, crude but successful disinformation campaigns, and village boycotts to redress unrelated grievances. If workers can't get to the children, they can't vaccinate them. The chart below shows this number to be much smaller than three years ago, plus the cases are in relatively few areas.

FAQ #3—So what's the main problem in reducing the number of vaccine-derived polio cases, most of which are occurring in African countries? Answer: Insufficient quantities of the new oral polio vaccine. This new vaccine significantly lessens the chances of the included weakened live polio virus mutating to a virulent virus after passing through the digestive systems of a number of children. Access to vaccinate is good in most African countries, but with only one major industrial source of the new mutation-resistant oral vaccine, supplies are not yet robust enough. Still, the chart below shows this number to be decreasing.

FAQ #4—After 35 years of exhausting effort and only a few wild polio cases remaining, why don't we just stop and declare "victory" now? Answer: The Global Polio Eradication Initiative estimates that if we simply stop all polio eradication efforts today, in 10 years, we will be seeing 200,000 wild polio cases every year. Yes, this is "only an estimate", but it's a science-based estimate by health authorities in the know. Stopping now is not a viable course of action.

FAQ #5—When we do finally stop transmission of the wild polio virus, won't we still see vaccine-derived polio cases if we continue to vaccinate? Answer: Eventually no, because countries will wean themselves off of using oral polio vaccines that present a mutation risk. The United States and most developed countries did that in the years 1998-2000, since then using only the injectable dead polio vaccine.

- Personalized "on target" flyers, accompanied by pre-populated donor forms
- Focus reports on:
 - Where are we now vs. goal (or, if more, last year)?
 - · What is needed to achieve goal?
 - · What is our "challenge goal" if the first goal is already well within reach?
 - · Number of EREYs to reach 100%
 - Number of Sustaining Members to reach 100%
 - Number of PHF needed to reach 100%
 - · Per capita giving amount
 - Recognition/thanks, if applicable, of what that donor gave to help the club already that year

The road to peace

his month, Rotary takes a step toward supporting peacebuilding in the Middle East and North Africa region.

In November, Rotary and District 2420 are hosting a signing ceremony for our newest peace center in partnership with Bahçeşehir University in Istanbul.

The ceremony is the first in a series of events recognizing the new center at BAU and Rotary's work to promote peace. The 2024 Rotary International Convention in May will mark 25 years since the first Rotary Peace Centers were announced — coincidentally at the Rotary Convention in Singapore in 1999. Recruitment for the first cohort of Rotary Peace Fellows at BAU also starts in 2024, and selected candidates will begin their program in early 2025.

Since its beginning, the peace centers program has prepared more than 1,700 peace fellows working in more than 140 countries to create a more peaceful world. That is certainly worth celebrating, but Rotary Peace Fellows are more than statistics on a page. Their actions have helped Create Hope in the World and will continue to do so.

For example, Jennifer Montgomery and Gorett Komurembe — peace fellows from the program at Makerere University in Uganda — are co-founders of Magenta Girls Initiative. The international nongovernmental organization equips Ugandan girls and young women with the support and tools to overcome harmful gender norms, generational poverty, gender-based violence, trafficking, and trauma.

Ndzi Divine Njamsi, another peace fellow who studied at Makerere, has taken lessons learned about Positive Peace and is sharing them with students of his own in Cameroon. He became interested in the Rotary Positive Peace Activator training program after witnessing extremism, online hate speech, and violence in Cameroon. Since completing the program, he has brought his lessons on peace to students at the Yaounde International Business School and other organizations in the Central Africa country.

The world needs more people like the graduates of the program at Makerere and our other peace fellows. To that end, we can all advance peace by encouraging our local peacebuilders to learn more about Rotary and apply for this impactful fellowship. Rotary members can also mentor candidates for the fellowship. Or you can work with peace fellows who have already graduated. They probably have an initiative or two that would benefit from your help.

Our peace centers in North America, Europe, Africa, Australia, and Asia depend on financial support as well. The program at BAU was made possible thanks to a generous gift of \$15.5 million to The Rotary Foundation from the Otto and Fran Walter Foundation.

This new Rotary Peace Center will offer a one-year professional development certificate in peace and development studies for fellows focusing on peacebuilding within the Middle East and North Africa region.

Peace must be waged persistently; it is the soil where hope takes root. But as with any journey, we take one step at a time. Let's take those steps together.

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



But, did you ever wonder what our donations to PolioPlus actually buy – in addition to the vaccine itself, of course? Here's what:


- Technical assistance, including salaries for technical advisors.
- Operational support to ensure that the vaccine reaches all the children, including stipends for millions of volunteers who



- Surveillance for disease detection, including the polio laboratory network.
- Social mobilization to raise awareness of the vaccination campaigns and the benefits of immunization.
- Research into new products and approaches to facilitate eradication.
- Transition planning to ensure the orderly transition of the polio immunization activities to routine immunization following the eradication of polio.

And there is more:

- Children are also vaccinated against other communicable diseases such as measles, the treatment of parasitic infections, and the provision of bed nets to protect against malarial mosquitoes.
- Rotary has also partnered with healthcare companies to provide "Wellness Camps," where large numbers of physicians provide free consultation and education to patients with other health issues.
- Rotary helps bridge cultures by working with others to engage community and religious leaders that help health professionals do their work.
- Rotarians, in areas affected by war, have managed to secure a ceasefire agreement between government and the rebels and could then reach approximately 95% of the children with vaccinations. This is known as "days of tranquility."
- Because of its nongovernmental status, Rotary has played a key role in cross-border immunization efforts delivering the vaccine across international borders and in remote regions.
