Education and Literacy Month:

Multiple District 7610 Rotary Clubs Partnered at, "Rally For Our Kids", and The Justice High School Pyramid 'Back-to-School' Fair.

Rally For Our Kids, by Susan Mullen

With limited resources, multiple Rotary Clubs in District 7610, partnered together with Giant Food, Costco, My Guys Moving, Brite Paths, Loudoun County Firefighters, Fire Fighters and Friends, Collect for Kids and two school systems (i.e., Loudoun County Public Schools (LCPS) and Fairfax County Public Schools (FCPS) - to help the most vulnerable students in our communities.

"At the Loudoun County School Board meeting room - 20 backpacks were stuffed and delivered to LCPS for those with the highest need. *My Guys Movers* (Terry Williams of Sterling Rotary) will be moving the supplies from the *Giant Food* Store to the Administration building. *FCPS* volunteers will be moving the supplies allocated for *Fairfax County* at the finale and *LCPS* will be sending out the backpacks with supplies to the schools via their own distribution system".



Final Tally—President Susan Mullen: "Three pallets of school supplies to Fairfax County and 65 back-

packs. In *LCPS*, 645 backpacks and an equal amount of school supplies. Estimated value of the school supplies was \$ 23,000. If you multiply the backpacks (710 x \$ 15), you can add another \$10,650. The Rotary Clubs that provided the most support were: **Purcellville, Leesburg Daybreak, Ashburn, and Sterling**. This was a real group effort. *FCPS* is really excited about the introduction to corporate sponsors and we are look-





ing at doing it region-wide. Plans are already under way for next year to continue this program as a region-wide project and to increase the number of participating *Giant Food* Districts - as well as add other corporate partners".

In cooperation with the *Bailey's Crossroads Rotary Club (BXRC)* and er Community partners, The *Justice (formerly Stuart) High School Pyramid Resource Fair* was held on Aug. 9th, at *Justice High School*, in Falls Church. In addition to *Justice High School*, the pyramid included: *Glasgow M.S; Bailey's E.S.; Bailey's Upper School, Beech Tree E.S.; Belvedere E.S.; Glen Forest E.S.; Parklawn E.S.; and Sleepy Hollow E.S.* More than 2,300 *Justice High School* students, along with parents, received 2,300 school supply kits—along with: free haircuts; dental exams; and more than 90 hearing tests. This is the fourth year of *BXRC* support for the fair. The fair was organized by Bailey's Rotarians **Kate Walter**, **Glad Hatchl** and **Sarah Shannon**. *BXRC* donated more than \$10,000 this year to support the fair.

Special Asst. to the DG—Jim Holcombe: "How do these 'mega-events' help the Rotary public image and expand its branding? "Supporting education is one of Rotary's six causes. Clearly, partnering in 'mega' community events' is the most efficient and arguably the most economical way to build the Rotary brand—through public recognition. This increases membership opportunities, too.

<u>Caveat:</u> At these 'mega-events', Rotary Clubs must differentiate themselves from other 'similar-thinking' service organizations"!

Education and Literacy Month: International Support

The MicheLo Project - Literacy, Disease Treatment, and So Much More! by K. Murphy and Jim Holcombe

On Aug 17th, 2018, the Founders of MicheLo, Michelle 'Meesh' Peters of the Bailey's Crossroads Rotary Club (BXRC), and Dr. Lois Wilson of the McLean Rotary Club, were the featured speakers, at BXRC. To some degree, MicheLo touches each of Rotary's six causes (i.e., Maternal and Child Health; Basic Education; Economic and Community Development; Peace, Disease, and Water and Sanitation).

The MicheLo project grew out of a Rotary Group Study Exchange (GSE) program. The Rotary Foundation's GSE program was a unique cultural and vocational exchange opportunity for business people and professionals between the ages of 25 and 40—who were in the early stages of their careers. Lois and Meesh were participants in the 2007 GSE program in southern Africa—where they were taken to the St. Joseph orphanage and school for children with disabilities, in rural Swaziland (about the size of New Jersey). Since that time, Rotarians Meesh and Lois have collaborated with: the members of the Manzini Rotary Club in Swaziland; the St. Joseph's School for the Disabled; and Swazi government representatives. They have been volunteering, every summer, since 2009. BXRC's President-Elect K. Murphy explains a chance encounter that initially brought Rotarian Meesh to BXRC: "Past-President Bill Bailey and I were selling Mustang Raffle tickets, which is the BXRC's fundraiser, in Shirlington. We spoke to Meesh about purchasing a ticket. While we were not able to sell Meesh a ticket, Rotary and the children of Swaziland were the ultimate winners as we found a fabulous new Rotarian instead! (Since then, Meesh has both purchased and sold Mustang Raffle tickets). While interacting with our local community for the purpose of fundraising, it is a powerful statement of the draw of Rotary that a discussion segued from "Wanna buy a ticket?" to "What do you want to do and how can Rotary help make that happen?" Eventually the question and discussion became, "Wow, want to work with Rotary, be part of the GSE, and change the world?" and, luckily for everyone, her answer was "Yes."

Initially, Meesh's focus was providing special education training at St. Joseph's School, in Swaziland. Swaziland is a country rich in culture. Unfortunately, it also has one of the highest rates of HIV-AIDS per capita in the world. Dentist Lois Wilson continues to provide much needed dental services, there. Since 2007, the scope of MicheLo has expanded—both in terms of scope and geographically. For example, a few years ago, another BXRC Rotarian Amy O'Malley travelled to Swaziland to develop and to provide, "physical therapy plans and protocols for the children at the school". Moreover, MicheLo has even become a supporter of legislation in Swaziland that protects children and women—a much exploited group in that country. Most noteworthy are: The Child Protective Act (2012); The Inclusive Education Act (2016); and The Sexual Offenses and Domestic Violence Act (2018)—to keep women safe. 'Meesh' Peters has recently visited: Vietnam, Guatemala and Malawi, as well with an eye to expanding the service model developed in Swaziland. Furthermore, 'Meesh' Peters and Dr. Wilson are now both serving at the District level. Meesh Peters is the Vocational Team Training Chair and Dr. Lois Wilson is the International Service Chair. MicheLo describes its own work as, "Awesome, inspiring, simple, happy, and a lot of work—and TOTALLY worth it. No challenge is too big for us!" The **Inspiration** newsletter agrees! 

Celebrating Assistant Governors:

C. Norman Wood - The Quintessential Assistant Governor

This issue celebrates our D7610 Assistant Governors and our Membership-Public Image Advisors. Assistant Governors are appointed by and work under the direct supervision of the District Governor. They are key players in helping Clubs to achieve their goals and objectives. They are assisted by the Area Foundation Advisors; The Membership-Public Image Advisors; by the combined resources of the District committees; Rotary International; and The



Rotary Foundation. These are, however, merely words. If you really want to know what really makes an Assistant Governor effective - one needs to look no further than the Late C. Norman Wood. Clearly, he was the quintessential Assistant Governor (Jim Holcombe, Newsletter Staff).

C. Norman Wood-Outstanding Assistant Governor and Rotarian, by Stan Coloff, IPP, Middlesex

He was motivating, inspiring, sometimes cajoling; and urging, always cheering; and encouraging, friendly, reassuring, advising, enlightening, instructive, educational, and the list could go on. Norm was an amazing Rotarian. All who knew him and particularly all the Rotarians in Area three Clubs - enjoyed and benefitted immensely from the leadership and thoughtful guidance of Norm in his role as Assistant Governor and greatly appreciate the time, care and special effort that he put into each of his Clubs.

Early in the preparation for my term as president of the Middlesex Rotary Club, Norm was there to guide and help with the transition to my new role. I quickly learned how valuable Norm was to my Club and the other Clubs, as well. We all greatly appreciated and welcomed his guidance and leadership. I knew he would always be available to help even at a moment's notice.

Early morning emails, around 4:30-5:00 am, were his preferred time to get started on the day's work. You could be assured of a quick response from Norm if you contacted him before 6 am. He offered to each Club, "If you need a speaker for your program - let me know. I have three talks about my career in the Air Force. I can present on a moment's notice". Our Club was fortunate to hear two of those talks, (which we thoroughly enjoyed), particularly the talk on, "How I became a General".

He instilled a desire among all the presidents and members of 'his' Clubs to succeed and do well in his view. Truly, he was like a 'coach' that you wanted to please. It was clear that he shared in the joy and satisfaction of your accomplishments. His motivation was not for his personal esteem; but rather it was to further the overall benefit to Rotary. What a remarkable example of, "Service above Self". In essence, this was the spirit and hall-mark of C. Norm Wood.

During what was to be the last few weeks of his life, Norm and I were working on plans for our Club's Installation Dinner. This event would, also, include a ceremony at which one of our members, Dr. Jerry Suyes, would be recognized as a major donor to the Paul Harris Foundation. Norm had plans to attend the Rotary International Convention, in Toronto, and would not thereby be available to make the presentation. He, also, noted that such an event warranted a much higher ranking District officer than himself to make the presentation someone such as the District Governor or the Paul Harris Foundation Chairperson. He said, "I'll run the trap line at the District Office". Norm pursued this task with determination. However, the District Governor had another engagement and the Paul Harris Foundation Chair was, also, committed - as were several others. Lt. Gov. Carol Foley graciously accepted and did a superb job Installing our new 2018-19 president, Janet Riggs. Carol presented Dr. Suyes with a beautiful crystal statue in recognition as a major donor. This is a simple story. Yet, it highlights and emphasizes the special effort and attention Norm brought to his job, as Assistant Governor. The Middlesex Rotary Club was named 2017-2018 Overall Top Club, in District 7610. I wish that Norm could have been there to share in the recognition of this accomplishment. Our Club had a very busy and productive year with several major projects. I can tell you with absolute certainty that Norm's guidance and encouragement played a huge role in bringing this honor to our Club. We are most grateful and appreciative for what he helped us to accomplish. His passing is a huge loss to Rotary. He left his mark on all who knew him and gave us a superb example of how to be a Rotarian. We all miss him terribly.

World Polio Day Competition: Your Club could win \$500 for its WASH Projects!

What is World Polio Day? World Polio Day is celebrated on October 24th. World Polio Day was established by Rotary International to commemorate the birth of Jonas Salk, who led the first team to develop a vaccine against poliomyelitis. Use of this inactivated poliovirus vaccine and subsequent widespread use of the oral poliovirus vaccine, developed by Albert Sabin, led to the establishment of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative.

Polio is a disease caused by a virus that affects the nervous system and is mainly spread by person-to-person contact. Polio can also be spread by drinking water or other drinks or eating raw or undercooked food that are contaminated with the feces of an infected person.

What must you do?

Whatever works best for your Community; The choice is yours! All we ask is that the project improve the quality of water and/or level of awareness of it in YOUR community. You could, for example:

- ⇒ Clean up debris along a waterway, lake, creek, pond, stream, or other water source.
- ⇒ Prevent erosion by planting trees and native plants along a water source.
- ⇒ Build awareness in your Community.
- ⇒ Encourage students to write essays on the importance of water and what THEY can do to protect it.
- ⇒ Encourage farmers in your area to use eco-friendly chemicals that will not damage fragile water systems.
- ⇒ If your community's water source is safe, eliminate plastic water bottles. If they are a necessity ensure they are collected and recycled appropriately.

Use your imagination! The bottom line is to educate your Community on the importance of protecting its water sources. Get them involved!

Whenever possible, please consult with your local water or conservation authority to ensure that your efforts are compatible with conditions in your area! For example, cleaning a watercourse, during spawning season, could have a negative impact on fish stocks. **Share your story**. Please use your project to celebrate **World Polio Day**. You can promote it at your regular Club meeting—closest to October 24, 2018. WASRAG will share some of them in its monthly newsletter. And, why not tell your story to the Rotary world yourself? **Go to the Rotary International website and post it on Rotary Club Central and/or Rotary Showcase!** Who will judge the entries? The members of WASRAG's Membership Satisfaction Team, including: Chris Etienne - USA (Chair), Salvador Rico – USA, Tom Bos - USA, Ada Cheng - Hong Kong, Rich Churchman - USA, Toro de Silva - Brazil, V.N. Singh - India, Ndukwe Chukwu - Nigeria and Rob Crabtree - New Zealand will review all applications and submit a short-list of finalists to WASRAG's Operations Team.

How do you enter the competition? Submit a brief description of your project to info@wasrag.org. Include what you are doing; the target audience; and the expected impact of the project. Remember to tell us your Club name and District number and give us a contact name, e-mail address and phone number. Some projects will be show-cased on the WASRAG website.

HOW IT ALL STARTED! Many of you will have read the fantastic story of the Rotary Club of South Ukiah (California) District 5130's "Cleaning the Rivers of the World" program in WASRAG's October 2017 Newsletter. 
