Priya Krishnan Project Touch Foundation

Today we welcome Priya Krishnan, a high school student who has made it her mission to help financially needy autistic children.

After seeing how her autistic cousin benefited from using an iPod Touch device, Priya researched the field and confirmed that autistic children respond better to intuitive, predictable touch devices than to

fellow noisy humans.

Priya then founded Project Touch, a nonprofit foundation that provides iTouch devices to autistic children from low-income families. She raised almost \$12,000 to purchase iTouches and, with the help of Autism Speaks, identified needy autistic children in Virginia who were given the devices on April 10.

Priya, who will be a senior at Thomas Jefferson High School this fall, hopes to expand Project Touch into a national and international organization.

From Eritrea to America: The Journey of a Lifetime

Growing up in the African land of Eritrea, Thomas Musa stretched his imagination by listening to Voice of America broadcasts and reading books donated from the United States. If America could put a man on the moon, that's the country where he wanted to live, he decided.

At the conclusion of his formal schooling, which began at his local St. Joseph's Elementary School, Thomas had the good fortune to find a benefactor who gave him a scholarship to St. John's College in Minneapolis — his ticket to the United States.

Today Thomas is a successful

educator, teaching information technology at several area universities. He offered a few words of wisdom at our July 14 meeting:

"The world is a beautiful place. We don't have to be limited by our beginnings," he said. "Be fearless. If you die, it's okay. But if you're afraid, you die a million times."

Africa is not a poor continent as many Westerners believe, Thomas said, citing extensive gold and copper deposits in Eritrea as an example. He said it would be better in the long run if other countries invested in the development of African countries rather than sending foreign aid.
