Improving Dublin Streets

Andy Russell, the City Engineer of Dublin, provided us an update of current street improvement projects in and near the City.

Amador Plaza Road The first two phases of this project – from Safeway to Sprouts -- consisted of constructing midblock crosswalks with special safety signing, restriping the roadway to eliminate some left turn movements, and repaving. The next phase, in two years, will install a southbound right turn lane at Dublin Blvd. The cost was \$1.4 million.

Tassajara Road Overlay Nearly 20,000 used tires gave up their life to provide the quieter and more durable rubberized asphalt resurfacing last summer when the traffic was lower during the closure to the north. It cost \$2.2 million; because of high volumes a portion of the work was done only at night.


Project Scope: Construction – 6 Stages, two lanes of travel in each direction during the project duration.

Tassajara Road Closure at Fallon Road This was a big deal – closing a main connection with Contra Costa County including San Ramon, Danville and Blackhawk for seven months. It widened a narrow twisting two lane road to four lanes divided and expanded a 9 foot diameter culvert that was 150 feet long to 18 feet in diameter and 400 feet long. The road is open but final touches are being made.

Dougherty Road Widening This is a \$23 million project that will complete the six-lanes from Dublin Boulevard to the San Ramon City

Measure BB.



Dublin Blvd. Widening This is on the northern border of the Sports Park near City Hall. It's a short project to complete six lanes and remove a major bottleneck. This cost about \$7 million and will be started next fall. It will likely be

widening entirely at night due to traffic. The power poles will be removed.

Dublin Blvd. Extension

When this is done, Mrs. Kinzel will be able to shop at Costco without using I-580. A main purpose of the project, which extends from Fallon Road in Dublin to Doolan Road (Casino 580) in Livermore, is to allow intercity travel to not be dependent on the freeway.

Planning is underway, but no construction funds are available yet.

Tassajara Road Precise PlanThis will straighten and widen the road from the new culvert at Fallon Road in Dublin to Windemere Parkway which connects to the east side of the Dougherty Valley.

Street Resurfacing Dublin needs to preserve its status as having the best paved roads in the Bay Area.


