His Rotary-Ann is Norma, and his two sons are following in his footsteps as police officers in Berkeley and Fremont. He also has a daughter who may follow a similar career.

The club's choice for this year's honored Paul Harris Fellowship were Past-presidents Bob Cook and Bernie Maisel, who were outstanding community leaders and still perform nobly for the club in scholarships, rodeo, the Concours and school and youth activities.

Under the leadership of Charley and Governor King, the Hayward Rotary Club is fast approaching the initially set goals to increase membership and has already increased the Paul Harris Fellowships to 27.
