amela Russo exemplifies Rotary's creed of "Service Above Self." As a registered nurse and later House Supervisor at St. Rose Hospital, Pam stood out as an extraordinary caregiver and leader dedicated to helping others. She then went on to serve as Executive Director of the hospital's charitable Foundation, where she helped raise millions



to support the hospital's work on a grander scale. And as Hayward Rotary Club member and later President, **Pam** created or supported numerous service projects including the Silva Pediatric Clinic, the Backto-School "Child Spree" event to give Hayward kids the gear they need for school, and the Sorensdale holiday gift-giving project for specialneeds adults, among many, many others. She also traveled to Uganda to bring needed medical supplies to a pediatric clinic in that country. In her current professional role as Executive Director of the Hayward Area Recreation and Park District Foundation, **Pam** is the driving force behind the fund development for Mia's Dream, a universally accessible playground planned for Tennyson Park.




Mia's Dream

Hayward Rotary Club and Foundation are proud sponsors of the Mia's Dream universally accessible playground project. The new playground, which is planned to break ground in 2018, is inspired by 10-year old Mia Vasquez, who has cerebral palsy and dystonia, a movement disorder that causes her muscles to contract uncontrollably. Her wish is to have a playground near her home in Hayward where she and other children with disabilities can play. Her parents, Emelyn Lacayo and Daniel Vasquez (pictured above with Mia at Tennyson Park), applied to the Make a Wish Foundation Greater Bay Area in 2015 and asked for help in building an all-accessible playground in Hayward. After their request was granted, Vasquez and Lacayo approached Hayward Area Recreation and Park District administrators and directors in early 2016 and asked if space could be set aside in a Hayward park for the playground. Park district directors unanimously agreed to dedicate an acre of space at South Hayward's Tennyson Park for the playground, which will be called, "Mia's Dream Come True: Where the Heart of the Bay Comes to Play."



The \$2.5 million park will have play structures designed to evoke key Hayward landmarks that Mia enjoys, including Sulphur Creek Nature Center, Hayward Executive Airport, Hayward Loop, Hayward shoreline, Hayward-San Mateo Bridge and the water tower at Cannery Park.

There also will be a music therapy area, interactive language board for children who can't see and a quiet zone for autistic children. "Mobility and motion is really important to children with special needs, so each of the various structures will incorporate all of our seven senses to best allow children to play, recreate and have fun," Pam said in an interview with The Daily Review newspaper about the project.

Mia's Dream is a one-acre, all-access playground for inclusive play opportunities for child developmental needs. It will replace an existing playground in Tennyson Park in Hayward and serve the local community as well as the greater Alameda County area. The new playground will provide a variety of play features and experiences for children of all abilities in a fun atmosphere. It includes elements of inclusion play for cognitive, physical, social, sensory and communication. Among the features are a Music Therapy Zone, Kindness Arches, Sensory Wall, Water Tower Look-out, swings and spinners, slides and rollers, and an Animal and Nature exhibit. "It will be very much designed with all disabilities in mind and how each child may respond to different forms of therapy." **Pam** said.

Though the playground will be specifically tailored for seniors and adults or children with disabilities, it also will help teach other children and adults how to empathize with those with special needs. When completed, Mia's Dream Park will be Hayward's first universally accessible playground and one of only a handful of such playgrounds in the Bay Area.

Mia's Dream Playground - Project Location

Tennyson Park is a public parkland situated on approximately 9.6 acres in the heart of the Tennyson Corridor between Huntwood and Ruus Roads. The park is adjacent to the Matt Jimenez Community Center and the Eden Youth Center. (One of Hayward Rotary Club Foundation's major past projects, the Silva Pediatric and Dental Clinic, is located in the Eden Youth Center.) Across Huntwood Road from the park is the Firehouse Clinic. Tennyson Park currently features a softball field, basketball court, outdoor restrooms, open fields, a skate park, and a "tot lot" playground. The park is slated for a major renovation, the centerpiece of which is the development of Mia's Dream universally accessible playground in place of the existing tot lot.
