Strokes are debilitating and life threatening experiences. Two very fortunate individuals shared their personal stories with us today. WARREN THOITS introduced our speaker by describing his recovery from a stroke. Our speaker, BOB PARSONS, was on his way to Taiwan when he experienced his stroke. Both individuals are devoting themselves to supporting educational efforts since information is so important to knowing the warning signs and treatment protocols.

The myths:

- -strokes cannot be prevented
- -strokes occur without warning signs
- -strokes only affect the elderly
- -strokes cannot be treated
- -strokes are not medical emergencies

The symptoms:

- -change in vision
- -difficulty with speech
- -unexplained weakness
- -change in sensation
- -severe headache
- -unexplained dizziness

What to do immediately upon identifying the symptoms:

- -CALL911
- -MEDICATIONS ARE AVAILABLE THAT CAN REVERSE THE AFFECT OF A STROKE BUTTHE PATIENT MUST BE TREATED WITHIN THE FIRST THREE HOURS
