### TODAY'S PROGRAM





LIZ KNISS introduced CARL GUARDINO, President and CEO of the Silicon Valley Manufacturing Group, to talk about economic and demographic trends in the Valley. Carl first announced that the Group is sponsoring a fuller program on the subject Tuesday, September 23, from 8:00 a.m.- 3:30 p.m. in the Mayer Theatre at Santa Clara University. He then illustrated the Valley's worst recession ever with the following changes in the last 36 months: Unemployment: from 1/6 % to 8.6 %. Jobs: from a 6-year increase of 300,00 to a loss of 200,000. Commercial vacancies: from low single digits to 30-40%.

Forthcoming challenges: Population increase by 2010: 13%, mostly from births. Portion of population able to afford average resale home in 2000: 20%. Increase in daily trips into Valley by 2010: 30%. Transportation funding: \$82 billion over 25 years, only \$7.7 for new work. K-12 enrollment: up 16% by 2010. In 2002, 14 % of teachers were uncredentialed, mostly in poor areas.

Despite its challenges, Silicon Valley has unparalleled human and intellectual resources, as evidenced by the fact that 120 other areas in the country have appropriated the word "Silicon" in describing their area, the most amusing being Florida's" Silicon Swamp." And the Manufacturing Group has led the way in proactive response to our challenges, with one outstanding example being the Housing Trust Fund, to which local companies and public entities contributed over \$20 million, \$11 million of which has already been leveraged to provide affordable housing to over 2800 families .

TODD LEWIS, who went on vacation at the outset of remodeling, returned to find only a foundation where his home used to be, and joined the club in hopes that things are going according to plan.
