

TODAY'S PROGRAM



Our guest speaker was Dr. TED LELAND, Stanford's Athletic Director. Introduced by STEVE PLAYER as the Farm's second longest tenured Director (after Al Masters), Ted has recently been on sabbatical at the Hoover Institute. Recently, he served

on the Secretary of Education's blueribbon Committee on Opportunity in Athletics and "Title Nine."



- 1. Accommodate all interests and abilities regardless of gender.
- 2. Make financial aid substantially proportionate.
- 3. The same with support facilities: lockers, uniforms, tutoring, etc).

Ted is enthusiastically in favor of Title Nine, as well he should be. Stanford recently won its ninth Director's Cup, indicative of the country's most successful athletic program, men's and women's combined.

Equality for women in athletics is overwhelmingly endorsed in this country. Approval for women in athletics roe from 20% to 95% (equal to men) between 1970 and 1990. Only one of over 700 who testified before his committee didn't favor gender equality. But are "quotas" the way to do it? Ted said he was "fine with quotas." Without them the drive for equality would progress much more slowly. A terrific talk.

(We Cal graduates don't understand how Stanford's athletic directors are more articulate than most of their professors. Professor Hunt, this Sunday's salon speaker, however, is excellent.)
