OPENING REMARKS

Were provided by JACK WOODSON, who shared insights on the San Francisco Giants and how the Giants fulfill the Rotary 4 Way test. Jack predicted success to the Giants if they follow the 4 Way and act as leaders, building good will and friendship through the game of baseball.

PROGRAM:

STEVE PLAYER honored BILL ALLHOUSE and welcomed William Neukom, CEO of the San Francisco Giants. Speaking on "The Giants' Way," Neukom, a lawyer by trade, became the leader of Giants baseball in October 2008, taking over for Peter Magowan as the team's Managing General Partner. The immediate past president of the American Bar Association, Neukom served as general counsel for Microsoft for 17 years.

Wearing one of his signature bow ties, Neukom provided

insights on the business of baseball, citing at least seven businesses categories the Giants pursue including: Playing baseball, entertainment, community service, information, development, education. investment talent and management.

But its clear baseball is more than a business for Neukom, who called the national pastime "the most nuanced and most subtle of all the major sports," and pointing out "there is no clock" in baseball.

He was upbeat about the Giants this season, so far playing over .500 ball, by "stepping over losing ways" of the past seasons.
