DAVE THORNTON'S OPENING REMARKS

"All kids are our kids." How many kids in your neighborhood can you name? Or say Hi to at the grocery store? Years ago it was different; youth were known; neighborhoods were tighter. Kids are now assigned to professional, therapists, coaches, etc. The impact of adult avoidance of youth has been detrimental. All kids need to have concrete experience values: known as the 41

developmental assets. Surveys shows kids who have at least 31 specific development assets, have the best chance of surviving the teen years, maturing, resisting drugs, etc. The fewer the developmental assets, the higher probability of trouble. Average in US is 19 assets, in Silicon Valley only 8% report having 31 or more developmental assets.

Week of May 24: Social event at Mike's in Menlo Park, following a tour of Menlo Atherton's new facilities.

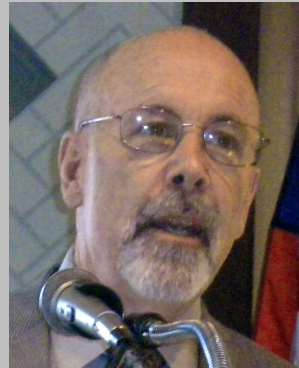
June 17: Cocktail party at MIKE COUCH'S house.

"THE WAR ON DRUGS"

Russ Jones was introduced by ROB LANCEFIELD



Russ grew up in Texas, now lives in Los Gatos Hills, and is involved with the war on drugs for 37 years with different enforcement and rehab agencies. MS from U of San Francisco.

Richard Nixon coined the phrase, "War on Drugs" in 1971. Russ started his career with San Jose police at the same time. Most arrests then were for being under

the influence. He discovered San Jose had become a hub of drug trafficking in 1975. 80% of prisoners then were in jail for drug-related offenses. Russ worked undercover with DEA in late 70's. But nothing was getting better: more OD's, arrests, etc. Walter Cronkite: "War on drugs is a failure."

Russ left enforcement in 1980 to work with reform efforts. He was invited by China and USSR to meet with their drug agencies and communities, and came back questioning how the US could regulate it, if the USSR couldn't succeed in their highly-controlled society.

Laws of supply and demand apply to the drug world, just like

the legal world. Russ feels that the drug problem continues to get worse, despite agency efforts. 1.9 million were arrested for drug use last year. (same as population of New Mexico.) Internationally, drug trade generates \$400 Billion, virtually ALL profit. The current US prison population is 2.2million, which is 22% of world's prisoners.

IF WE WANT DIFFERENT RESULTS

We need to redefine the debate, and get away from law enforcement, as it is not effective. You can be anti drug and pro reform.

We need a new policy that is based upon reality that offers good value for the money spent, remove the profit motive, end

prohibition, and regulate drugs instead. Doctors should be able to prescribe drugs to treat addiction as a health problem, instead of a crime, which will reduce marketing to kids.

Harm reduction policies have been successful in Switzerland, resulting in a 50% decline in OD's deaths, and a 60% drop in drug related deaths. Employment among addicts has increased.

QUESTIONS/ANSWERS

Q: What about medical marijuana?

A: Good to have

Q: Why can't we get drugs regulated by BATF?

A: Moral arguments prevent. The treatment industry doesn't want to intervene.

Q: How do we deal with US puritanical attitude?

A: Difficult

Q: Where do hard drugs fit in?

A: Any drug you don't want to legalize will be left to kids, unfortunately.

Q: Does legalized marijuana increase crime?

A: No! State and Federal law conflicts...any Federal progress?

A: Progress on state
