TOM GRACON presented an executive summary of the results of a poll of the Members that was taken in November concerning satisfaction with various aspects of existing arrangements and practices, as well as areas for improvement. Details of the results appear on the Club's website.

SHERRI SAGER urged Members to make donations for auctioning at the Club fundraiser on April 9, and to purchase tickets to attend what should be a quite festive and financially significant gathering. She then auctioned a collection of green cookies, evoking St. Patrick's Day. ROGER SMITH won the bidding.

THE PROGRAM: <u>Leeor Neta</u>, "A Second Chance for <u>East Palo Alto</u>"

JUDITH STEINER introduced Mr. Neta as an entrepreneur of services rather than financial aspirations, having founded the East Palo Alto Youth Court a few



years ago, and served as its Executive Director for two years. He received a bachelor's degree from New York University, and a law degree from the University of Chicago. He worked on Death Penalty cases, and more generally as a Public Defender, and now

teaches at the Golden Gate School of Law.

With the cooperation of law enforcement officials, juveniles arrested in East Palo Alto come before the Youth Court. There young juries hear about their transgressions in a constructive and non-adversary way and impose sentences of community service, rather than incarceration. Offenders are required to serve on subsequent juries, and may volunteer to serve as bailiffs and lawyers. The Youth Court also counsels the families concerning the offenses and the range of available public services. Compared to normal court proceedings, the Youth Court has seen remarkably low recidivism rates, as low as five percent. Juveniles emerge from the Youth Court without a criminal record of any sort. A brief video reviewed one young man's successful experience going through the Youth Court.

Mr. Neta mentioned that he has recently started working

with Oakland to initiate a similar "Restorative Justice" program there. He motivates his law students to get involved in such programs. A lively Q&A session followed in the time remaining.

An announcement that the East Palo Alto Youth Court is a recipient of a grant this year from the Club evoked substantial applause as the meeting ended.
