KLEINBERG, a former mayor. Her first questions delved into Sid's background: Born in Gilroy, son of an engineer from Mexico and teachereducator mother from Seattle - Inspired to

be involved in public service - Feels life dedicated to others provides happiness – Learned philanthropy at Harvard and that giving away well was a very difficult task. Other questions provided an exciting "been there done that " list – Meeting Oprah Winfrey, Nelson Mandela - Working in the Clinton White House with Janet Reno - Meeting with President Obama just last week. Then came the hard balls - What is to enjoy about being mayor? (doing it and making it happen) - What are the disappointments/challenges? (time demands) - How prepared are we for the inevitable earthquake? (only 15% of the way) – What progress on the Stanford Hospital? (due diligence being completed and should be ready to go ahead in two months) - How do we solve the public employee benefit problems? (significant changes required and need to work for longer term solutions). Ending on a personal note, Sid confirmed that he really believes in what he is doing, but shared that he has a secondary interest in photography. To conclude, WALT HAYS, LEANNAH HUNT, LE LEVY and others threw in (friendly?) questions involving High Speed Rail, Boards and Commissions, the size of the Council, and firefighters' salaries.
