GEORGE FITZGERALD introduced our speaker,



James Fearon, who was recently the Chair of the Political Science
Department at Stanford University, and who made a very interesting presentation on what took so long for the Arab spring uprising to occur. He explored two questions. The first question was what is the explanation for the sudden outbreak

President SHERRI SAGER had RICK RAYBIN lead us in the pledge. ROB LANCEFIELD introduced visiting Rotarians: Diego Christensen from General Sarmiento (Mexico), Tony Villanueva making up from San Mateo (CA), Thomas Dittler from Munich East (Germany), and Manjunath Shetty (who likes to be called "Shetty" only) from the Bangalore Whitefield Club (India). Sheety shared the sad news that he had just heard that his District Governor in India had suddenly died; and asked that we stand in his remembrance. Sheety also brought a guest, Sunil Hegae. Other visitors were: Ed Gordon (son of SAM GORDON); award-winning journalist from EPA, Henrietta Burroughs (friend/neighbor of ANNETTE GLANCKOPF); offduty Judge Jim Kleinberg (spouse of JUDY KLEINBERG); and Shirley Negrin (wife of DAVID NEGRIN). After introducing his spouse, David announced that it was his birthday (87 and going strong!) and, despite being a Perpetual President's Club Member, he would make a contribution to the annual charities.

Before deserting us for San Francisco, NICK NICHOLS



made his first and last opening remarks in his 13 years with the club. NICK spoke of seminal events in the computer revolution and posed the question of what comes next. Then he took a look at the bad (flood of emails, identity theft, and scary amount

of personal data available) and the good (improved automobile control, safer aircraft, and incredible extent of data readily available). He asked who still uses a machine called a typewriter, which directly produces

and why didn't the experts and regimes see it coming? The other was why didn't it happen sooner? The speaker described the problems of coordination in dictatorships with repressive regimes, and how chance events can create a tipping point. He also talked about the strength of contagion effects, and the example of the riots in London making it safe enough to go over the threshold of lawlessness. He mentioned the social media factor and its ability to provide community coordination. In winding up, he characterized the interplay of oil, monarchy, Islam and Arab Culture in the status of the Arab nations. In response to a question from DAN QUINN, the speaker opinioned that the leadership in China is very concerned with the new technology, but at the same terrified by it. In the long run, he believes that they will probably lose. In answer to a question by JUDY KLEINBERG, the speaker said that Al Qaeda was not a major factor in the unrest, but that there was a leaning towards eventual Islamic government elements.
