PROGRAM

ANDY COE introduced our speaker, Joel Brinkley. Joel is the Hearst Visiting Professional in Residence at Stanford. He joined the Department of Communication in the fall of 2006 after a 23-year career with The New York Times. There, he served as a reporter, editor, and Pulitzer Prize winning foreign correspondent.

At Stanford, Brinkley writes an op-ed column on foreign policy that appears in about 50 newspapers and websites in the United States and around the world. His areas of research include American foreign policy and the future of the nation's newspaper industry. He is a native of Washington D.C., and a graduate of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. At The New York Times, Brinkley served as Washington correspondent, White House correspondent, and chief of the Times Bureau in Jerusalem, Israel. Over the last 30 years, Brinkley has reported from 46 states and more than 50 foreign countries. He won the Pulitzer Prize for International Reporting in 1980.

Opening with his attention-getting opinion that Israel has a terrible self-defeating government and "needs to grow up," Joel went on to explain that Palestine is beginning to control its future by not blaming everything on Israel. When will there be peace between the two? "Not in my lifetime." The Mid-East peace process is an oxymoron. Israel should recognize Palestine with an opportunity coming up at The United Nations this November.

Q: What about the Israeli press?

A: They have a genuinely free press.

Q: Is there a chance the US can bring Israel and Palestine together?

A: In 2009 President Obama suggested Israel stop settlement activity, which was a non-starter, so a US negotiated peace is very unlikely.

Q: Why does Congress historically back Israel?

A: Their support is unexplainable and baffling.

SHERRI thanked Joel for his provocative presentation and promised a dictionary will be presented to a second grader at Green Oaks Academy in his honor.
