MIKE McMAHON noted that this was officially the last day of THE ROTARY FOUNDATION drive, and urged members to contribute.

TREASURER CASH ALAEE noted that the ANNUAL FUNDRAISER will be on April 14, and urged members to think of good items for the Silent Auction.

BILL BUSSE showed dazzling slides of two club projects:

- (1) Sun shades over tables at Greer Park, initiated by ANNETTE GLANCKOPF
- (2) A Sister City Display: a pole with signs pointing toward our six sisters, initiated by CHESLEY DOUGLAS. ANNETTE GLANCKOPF donated \$50 in honor of BILL's work and pledged the other \$50 for the President's Club on project completion.

PROGRAM

TOM GRACON introduced Masood Farivar, currently a Knight Fellow at Stanford, noting that the program invites 20 outstanding journalists/year for a year-long sabbatical, of which about 10 are international; and three are invited to speak to us, offering a different perspective on world events. Mr. Farivar is Afghan, escaped to Pakistan when the Soviets invaded, studied the Koran in a madrassa there, joined the mujahideen, to fight the Soviets, became disillusioned with the Taliban, came to the U.S. and earned a degree at Harvard, and returned to Afghanistan in 2007 to work for the Interviews Network, managing the country's largest network of independent radio stations.

Mr. Farivar said Afghans felt euphoric when the U.S. helped drive the Russians out of his country, but then felt abandoned when the Taliban took over and shut all local media except one government station. When NATO drove Taliban out of office after 9/11/01, media blossomed,



going from one government station to over 100 private ones, plus 30 TV stations and many magazines. In his job, Mr. Farivar has introduced popular programs such as "Farm Talk," modeled after NPR's Car Talk. USAID has spent over \$1 billion on programs to counteract the Taliban. Mr. Farivar expressed hope that the West would not again abandon Afghanistan, but opined that free media are now too entrenched to be oppressed again.
