ROB then introduced MARY QIAN, who is sponsored by NINA



MOORE. MARY is Editor in Chief of Sound of Hope Chinese Radio Network. She has written over 100 classic Chinese poems. She was born in China and remembers when she was 10 years old grabbing books before they were to be burned. MARY has one brother and one sister. She recounted once accidently feeding brother liquor, instead of cough syrup! MARY attended the Academy of Art in SF and Cal State Hayward. She has

one son who went to UC Davis. In 2001, she started working with Chinese media to provide news for the local Chinese community about China/Taiwanese events. MARY wants to get more involved with the Palo Alto community and to learn more about Western culture. Her mother's family helped with the move and US College.

ROB introduced former club President, BOB SMITHWICK, who

recounted the story of Rotary accepting women as members. Rotary had been an all-male organization until 1989. BOB recounted how PA Rotary met at Rickey's in 1986, just



after a Monterey Rotary conference. BOB invited a guest from the Duarte Rotary, whose club had admitted three women. But as a result, Duarte's charter was revoked by Rotary International. On appeal by Duarte in 1987, the US Supreme Court ruled women could not be excluded by gender. On June 7, 1987, Palo Alto Rotarian GLORIA HOM was voted in as first woman formally to join Rotary International within moments of US Supreme Court decision. Duarte got their charter back. Now, there are over 145,000 women Rotarians.

GLORIA HOM (her birthday is today!) thanked Bob and remembered the 1987 club was very welcoming, particularly among the older members. She mentioned some Hong Kong Clubs today don't admit men! Various Rotarians recalled anecdotal memories.
