JULIE JEROME was introduced by PRES HAL as being equal to Sherlock Holmes smarter brother. JULIE had the pleasure of introducing our speaker, Palo Alto Mayor Yiawey Yeh, graduate of JLS Middle



School and Gunn High School, all while JULIE was on the Palo Alto School Board. She came with testimonials from his teachers.

The Mayor said this would be an update on a few issues of importance to the citizens, starting with the budget. With necessary cuts, the community has stepped up to add funding to some city services. Recently the Friends of Palo Alto Animal Services was formed to raise

hundreds of thousands of dollars each year. The Library has a Friends organization and a Foundation that is being used as a model for others. There may possibly be a Friends group to support green bike lanes, coming out of the Bike and Pedestrian Master Plan.

The Mayor acknowledged **WALT HAYS** for his service on the Blue Ribbon Committee on Infrastructure. Prioritizing needs for a new Public Safety building, and upgrading the Rinconada and Mitchell Park Fire Stations were part of their report.

Another area of the report focused on how to engage youth in community development. A unique Youth Video Corps of students from Gunn and Paly are taping infrastructure needs of community buildings.

Q&A: The first question was on High Speed Rail: The PA Council is opposed to what was passed by the legislature, preferring the blended system for HSR and CalTrain that was proposed and supported by local, state, and national legislators representing our area.

Weekly council meetings are important, in answer to another question. The Mayor feels they are beneficial, but he tries to end them by 11 p.m. Discussions on the future of the Cubberley site will be very important and take a lot of meetings.

A Housing Element required by the Association of Bay Area Governments (ABAG) needs to be approved and was on the Monday night agenda. Having an approved element can be valuable to the city in dealing with the state.

The last question asked was about the traffic impact by the San Antonio Shopping Center Development to the Palo Alto portion of San Antonio Road. The Mayor said the Mountain View City Council does communicate on such a topic with Palo Alto.
