#### **ANNOUNCEMENTS**

President-Elect STEVE EMSLIE reminded Rotarians of Refreshments and Recognition scheduled for the Picnic on Sunday, August 5 from 3 to 6PM, at Greer Park in Palo Alto at the corner of Colorado and West Bayshore. The Picnic celebrates both the completion of the Hands-On Project to install Sun Screens over the picnic tables, designed by BILL BUSSE and installed by many Rotarians, and is the Summer Social to inaugurate President HAL MICKELSON.

#### **PROGRAM**

YORIKO KISHIMOTO introduced our speaker, Louis S. Thompson, of Thompson, Galenson and Associates, LLC in



Saratoga. His curriculum vitae can be found in the first Bibliography entry. He is a member of the California High-Speed Rail Peer Review Group.

Lou started by discussing the evolution of modern high-speed rail from Japan to Europe and to the Northeast Corridor of the United States. The California High-Speed Rail Project is planned to be 520 miles from San Francisco

to Anaheim via San Jose, the Central Valley, and Los Angeles. Each end is "bookended" by the major urban connectors in San Francisco, Caltrain, and Los Angeles, Metrolink. The project started in 1996 in the promotional stage. It progressed to Proposition 1A in 2006-2008 as a \$9.95B project to be 50% matched by other than the State of California. The project was helped by the financial collapse of 2008, when it received \$2.6B in funds from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009. These funds have the requirement that the Central Valley section of the project must be expended by 9/30/2017. In November, 2011, the draft of the 2012 Business Plan was completed with a proposed funding plan that amounted to \$100B for the 500 miles.

At this point the Peer Group, of which Lou is a member weighed in with the opinion that:

Plans were inadequate and recommended no funding.

No known funding beyond the initial step.

Business model is incomplete and contradictory.

Limited utility, if only Central Valley is completed.

Management resources and structure is unworkable.

Peer Group questioned demand forecast, capital costs, and risk management.

In 2012 there have been many further changes:

Governor Brown has committed to the project, installing new Management:

Carbon trading income could be used to fill in the funding gap. Added \$1.1B in bookend projects, i.e. Caltrain electrification. Released clearer Business Model.

The operation of trains will be contracted out.

Lowered demand forecast and cost estimate.

SB 1029, Budget Act of 2012, signed.

Lou then forecast that:

3 Design/Build Contracts will be released for initial Central Valley section, which is at 30% design stage.

Should be rapid movement on Caltrain and Metrolink projects. Caltrain electrification needs to move rapidly ahead, since State Treasurer has right to take funding away for Central Valley.

Environmental litigation appears certain.

The 2014 Business Plan should have improved demand estimates. Overall, you should look at High-Speed Rail as a Process; it is not a Construction Project.
