THE PROGRAM: Radha Basu, Frugal Innovation



TOM GRACON reviewed Radha Basu's extensive and varied provided experience and examples of small scale frugal innovation, and said that how to scale up presented a big challenge that she would address. She focused on creating accessible, affordable, and appropriate technologies emerging markets/developing countries, which in India alone comprise hundred billion dollar markets. She emphasized that mobile phones play a transformative role in the economic growth of emerging markets,

leapfrogging land lines at very low costs to facilitate communications and access to enormous amounts of relevant data. Three-quarters of the world's 5.3 billion mobile phones exist in emerging markets; and aggregate Gross National Products of developing nations are projected to surpass those of developed countries in 2016. Professor Basu sees substantial opportunities in the U.S. and other developed economies to develop frugal-innovation products and processes. It is necessary to start such development with consumer needs and work backwards. Three "bottom lines" must pass muster: financial, social, and environmental. Among the developments already in place is a cell phone/microscope combination that uses the phone's camera to transmit images of microscopic images, useful in medical advances and other fields.
