President HAL thanked Team Rotary, **DAVE PRICE** at the lunch ticket table, plus, **DICK**, **STEVE**, and Pinion writer

HAL then had the privilege of introducing our speaker - his Stanford classmate and friend of 40+ years, Philip Taubman, a Consulting Professor at International Security and Cooperation and Associate VP for University Affairs. In preparation for his multiple careers, Phil was editor of the Stanford Daily in 1969. He was a writer and editor for the NY Times for over 30 years, serving as bureau chief in Moscow and Washington.

Taubman's sobering talk was about the current state of nuclear threats



and the possibility of a nuclear 9/11. Phil's book, *The Partnership: Five Cold Warriors and Their Quest to Ban the Bomb*, was published earlier this year. It examines the nuclear initiative, describes its genesis, and reveals how five men have influenced President Obama's nuclear agenda. The "Partners" are former Secretaries of State George Shultz and Henry Kissinger, former Secretary of Defense Bill Perry, former Senator Sam Nunn of Georgia, and Sid Drell, professor emeritus at SLAC.

Nuclear terrorism exists as a threat because a uranium bomb is simple to make, if one has 60 pounds of highly enriched uranium. Post WWII, highly enriched uranium was sent by the US to dozens of countries for positive uses. It is safe to handle. However, it can become what is referred to as a "dirty bomb." Defense Secretary Robert Gates has said that damage to property is negligible, but damage to human life is extreme.

In what led to the creation of the Manhattan Project, Einstein said to FDR in 1939, that a bomb carried to a port, such as NY Harbor, would destroy everyone and everything in the nearby area, taking the life out of NY and NJ. This statement is equally true today, and one of the greatest concerns of those working to reduce the risk. Russia has staggering amounts of highly enriched uranium. The former Soviet State of Georgia is where it is smuggled through to Turkey, the Middle East, and S.E. Asia. Pakistan, a highly unstable country, is the most dangerous country that has it, according to Dr. Bill Perry.

During Q&A, BERN BEECHAM asked how we have eluded attack so far. Phil said Dr. Kissinger believes within the next ten years, it is highly likely to be used; and once one is used, we would have to clean it up. A better plan is to address the problem before that day comes. ROB **LANCEFIELD** asked if moderate Muslims are helping to reduce the threat. The answer was, sadly, they are not, so far. HENNRIETTA **BURROUGHS** asked about Pakistan being such a threat. Phil's reply was that it is a quandary on how to approach them with any success. Oddly enough, because Iran is a more rigidly controlled society, it is easier to deal with them. JOHN KIDD offered a favorite Einstein quote in thanks to our speaker for one of our best programs ever. RALPH ADAMS mentioned the one-man nuclear weapon delivery system called the "Davey Crockett" to show how easily one person can conduct a nuclear attack. A final question was - given that the average age of The Partners is 85, who would follow these five PARTNERS in their focus on nuclear risk reduction? Phil said that while there is not a clear answer, there are people in and out of government who will rise to this task.

Thank you, **PRESIDENT HAL**, for bringing this excellent speaker and crucial topic to us. The meeting was adjourned.
