#### THE PRO AND CON

DIANA DIAMOND was called upon to give the pro and con on Santa



Clara County Measure A, a request put forth by our Board of Supervisors for a 1/8¢ increase in our sales tax over ten years. It will raise \$500M for the general fund to balance the cuts that have been necessary due to decreased revenues. These funds cannot be taken away by the State. YORIKO

KISHIMOTO spoke about Measure B, a request put forth by the Santa Clara County Water District, to

## **PROGRAM**

Today's program featured the dynamic work of our club's World Community Service, supported by our members and their contributions to The Rotary Foundation (TRF). WCS Chair WALT HAYS began his presentation by urging all members to support TRF during our drive this month and throughout the year. There are \$100 Sustaining Members; \$200 Double Sustainers; \$500 Super Sustainers; and \$1,000 Paul Harris Fellows. TRF goal is *Every Rotarian Every Year*. Checks may be given to PRESIDENT HAL at any meeting or donations made online, anytime, at Rotary.org. Funds return to the District and to our programs directly.

First WALT gave an overview with slides about our many successful



projects. He introduced Cindy Wilber, the Education Coordinator at Stanford's Jasper Ridge, and since 2004, our contact for our programs in Mexico's Yucatan area of Chicxulub. With the Rotary Club of Merida, Mexico, we have worked to improve conditions for education, health and self-sufficiency for the people. The latest project is the weekly Farmer's Market that is bringing people and produce together without a middleman, therefore

improving income to the growers. Children in the village also learn to grow and eat better food, which reduces their incidence of diabetes. Additional benefits are using math skills as they barter among the sellers.

Cindy expressed grateful appreciation to PA Rotary for our support of



many good works. And it will continue. WALT talked about our composting toilet projects in Haiti, where a site visit was made earlier this year by members of our club: HAYS, LEVYS, SWENSONS, and JAYNE BOOKER. The artistic nature of the Haitian people makes these buildings where toilets are housed very beautiful. Sasha Kramer, who has visited our club in the past, and works with SOIL, Sustainable Organic

Integrated Livelihoods, makes this possible with PARC support.

JOCELYN VILLARUZ told of the project in the Philippines called Mend



a Broken Heart, which supports surgeries for babies and children born with a hole in their hearts, and can't afford the surgeries on their own. Doctors and nurses donate their time, and what would be financially impossible to afford here, we help pay only for the cost of the hospital fee, medication, and testing. Four children have been helped and four more are on

the list. We have thank you letters from the families. LE LEVY made a pitch for the next "hands on" trip being planned to Cameroon next March, to visit our project in the National Park that protects the gorillas, and the workers who benefit from our support. Our member SUSAN LUTTER is our liaison to the project. Many thanks to WALT HAYS and all who participate in these Rotary International Projects, planned at the club level and funded by our members, with matching funds from the District and RI.
