### **PROGRAM**

The program consisted of Vocational Talks by three distinguished Rotarians from our club.

DON MORGAN talked about the first of his two vocations which he s aid



was more fun than his law career. He trained for a year to be a Naval Aviator then flew a P4M-1Q Mercator in the Western Pacific Ocean in the late 1950's during the Cold War. For details of this aircraft check out the Wikipedia entry. After earning his wings, Don was assigned to an Electronic Counter Measure Squadron in Japan. The planes flew signals intelligence missions along the periphery of China, Russia, and North Korea and participated in the Quemoy and Matsu

islands conflict in the Taiwan Strait. One of the fun events Don described was landing on the Aleutian Island of Shemya with a 100 ft ceiling, one quarter mile visibility, and a 70 knot crosswind!!

After a 20 year, interesting and exhausting advertising career in Silicon Valley, SUSAN LUTTER, talked about the joys and challenges of her non-



profit, Ape Action Africa, located in Cameroon, a couple of hours away from the capital Younde in a tropical forest. Ape Action's mission is to save orphaned, endangered primates from poachers anywhere in the country. After her initial visit, Susan asked how can I help? Among her activities are accessing services from her home on the Internet, contacting donors, and hauling thousands of pounds of and materials supplies (all dutifully inspected by Homeland Security) on

her frequent trips to Cameroon. Among the joys of supporting Ape Action: exceptional individuals she meets along the way, the extraordinary generosity of Americans, working to strengthen the neighboring communities in the rain forest, and the satisfaction of completing projects such as the Palo Alto Rotary supported water project. The challenges include: long distance on-line communications such as email and Skype, and the difficulties of completing tasks at long distance.

The final speaker was MEL MATSUMOTO, Executive Director of Channing



H ouse, who stepped in on short notice to tell of his 40 years of joy working with older people. He described some of the ethical dilemma's such as the "when to give up driving" conversation. There is no simple answer, it depends on what the resident thinks is right, and the family dynamics. The only agency that can forbid someone from driving is the California Highway Patrol. They can be advised anonymously. It is important to have the conversation.
